Gateway ADD region receives \$500,000 cleanup grant

Last Thursday, Gov. Andy Beshear announced more than \$6 million to help Kentucky communities expand economic development and tourism opportunities through the restoration of previously blighted and unused property, including a \$500,000 grant for the Gateway Area Development District.

"This funding allows us to give new life to formerly abandoned properties with modern uses," said Gov. Beshear. "Through these projects we are making good on our promise for a better, stronger new Kentucky home.'

Gov. Beshear awarded Gateway Area Development District a \$500,000 Community-wide Assessment Grant to inventory, assess and conduct cleanup planning and community engagement activities in the cities of Salt Lick, Frenchburg, Mount Sterling, West Liberty and Morehead. Priority sites

include a vacant hotel, a

6.27-acre former elementary school, a train depot that has been vacant and unused since 1980, a 2-acre former sawmill and an abandoned and flooddamaged retail storefront. "Gateway Area Develop-

ment District is honored to receive a \$500,000 EPA Brownfields Communitywide Assessment Grant to support the revitalization of properties across Bath, Menifee, Montgomery, Morgan and Rowan counties," Joshua Farrow, executive director of the Gateway Area Development District said. "The program will assess and identify brownfield sites for cleanup and redevelopment, which is essential to expanding the local tax base, attracting private investment and supporting our region's growing tour-

ism economy.' Since 2007, Kentucky communities have received \$40.5 million in EPA brownfield funding through the assistance

of DEP's Brownfield Program.

"When we give brownfield properties a new life that serves our communities, we're showing the nation and future generations that we have fully invested in protecting our environment and our people," Energy and Environment Cabinet Secretary Rebecca Goodman said. "There's nothing more rewarding than maximizing the potential of our people through the sustainable re-
