zier, Edward Goins and Kirk Mount are all connected to the "house of horrors" case, in which a young girl escaped a residence and found a safe haven at a neighbor's home prior to the Fraziers' arrest. Goins and Mount were arrested shortly thereafter.

The young girl, according to court records, endured extreme

abuse and torture - sexual, physical, emotional and psychological.

The Fraziers face 40 combined felony charges.

Austin Frazier is charged with two counts of first-degree sexual abuse, female genital mutilation, 13 counts of first-degree criminal abuse of a child 12 or under, kidnapping a minor, two counts of first-degree strangulation and second-degree cruelty to animals. Kayla Frazier faces the same criminal abuse, kidnapping and

animal cruelty charges, and she is charged with being complicit to sexual abuse, genital mutilation and strangulation.

Goins and Mount face the same charges: first-degree criminal abuse of a child 12 or under, kidnapping of a minor and failure to report child neglect or

abuse. All four defendants are scheduled to appear again for a pre-trial on July 31.

Austin Frazier has been in Greenup County Detention Center. The other three are in Boyd County Jail.
