The interment was in Cave City Cemetery.

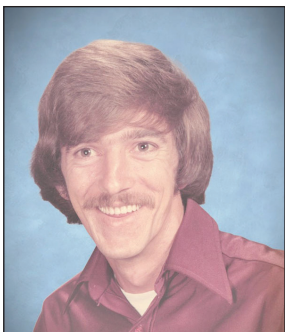

### EDMONSON COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION NOTICE OF HEARING

The Edmonson County Board of Education will hold a public hearing in the Edmonson County Board of Education on September 04, 2025, at 5:00 PM to hear public comment regarding a proposed general fund tax levy of 51.8 cents on real property and 51.8 cents on personal property.

The General Fund tax levied in fiscal year 2025 was 47.8 cents on real property and 47.8 cents on personal property and produced revenue of \$4,586,793.51. The proposed General Fund tax rate of 51.8 cents on real property and 51.8 cents on personal property is expected to produce \$5,658,416.36. Of this amount \$440,945.68 is from new and personal property. The compensating tax for 2026 is 44.6 cents on real property and 44.6 cents on personal property and is expected to produce \$4,871,918.33.

The general arts to which revenue of \$1,071,622.85 above 2025 revenue is to be allocated are as follows: Cost of collections, \$23,575.50; building fund \$728,900; instruction, \$319,147.15.
