What to Expect from FEMA Housing Inspectors

If you applied to FEMA for is safe to live in. assistance, a FEMA inspector inspection to review damages from the Kentucky severe storms and tornadoes to determine whether your home is safe, sanitary and habitable. Here is what to expect from the home inspection process.

HOME INSPECTIONS

Within 10 days of submitting an application for assistance to FEMA, FEMA staff or inspectors may call to discuss your disaster-caused damage and schedule an appointment for an inspection. Housing inspectors will make an appointment to meet you at your address by calling or texting you at the phone number listed on your FEMA application. Note that inspectors will never contact you by social media or email and that all FEMA representatives have official identification. FEMA inspectors will not show up to your nome without an will always have an official FEMA badge and will never ask for your Social Security number.

When the FEMA inspector will contact you to set up a home calls, be sure to record and safely store the following information:

- The inspector's name.
- Date of call.

It is very important that you answer the call. Note that the inspector's phone number may be from out of state or show up on caller ID as "unavailable' or "unknown." An inspector will attempt to contact you multiple times over multiple days. If inspectors cannot reach you, your case will be delayed, and you will need to contact FEMA by going to a Disaster Recovery Center or calling 800-

The inspector may ask you to verify personal information including your name, address, and contact information. They will want to know who owns and occupies the damaged appointment. DURING THE INSPECTION

The inspection process usually takes 30 to 45 minutes. II you were able to take photos or videos of interior or exterior damage to your home, show them to the inspector.



WKU Bands to celebrate 100 years with The Summer Twilight Concert Series The Western Kentucky University Bands a band director with the Lincoln County

continues to celebrate 100 Years (1925-2025) with a series of two summer concerts in June with the Southern Kentucky Concert Band at WKU.

The program will include a wide variety of musical styles from 1940's swing tunes to marches by Sousa and the program will open with the theme from the hit movie, Superman. WKU Director of Bands, Dr. Gary Schallert said of the concert, "This program includes something for everyone. There is a toe-tapping polka number (yes really), a beautiful work written by Nashville composer, Jay Dawson, entitled, Land Between which was commissioned by the band directors of the District-1 Kentucky Music Educators Association; thus the title Land Between (the Lakes), a great compilation of 1940s swing charts masterfully arranged for concert band, and more."

The second concert is scheduled for Saturday, June 21 at 7:30 p.m. in the DSU Auditorium. This program will celebrate the life and musical influences of Professor Joe Stites, a former conductor of the Southern Kentucky Concert Band and Professor of Music at WKU. Professor Stites passed away on Saturday, March 1, 2025. Several guest conductors will share the podium with Dr. Schallert including Joe's brother, Tom Stites, a retired high school band director and music administrator the Owensboro School District, Joe's son, Jim,

Schools, Joe's life-long friend, Bowling Green Resident, Larry Long, and Dr. John Stroube, Executive Director of the Kentucky Music Educators Association. The program will feature some of Professor Stite's favorite works for concert band performed by former

students, friends, and colleagues of Stites. Both concerts are free and open to the public, and there is plenty of free parking close to the Downing Student Union. Please join us for a fun evening of terrific music

for concert band. The first band at the Western Kentucky Teachers College (WKTC) was formed in 1925, as a student organization and was led by student director, Joyce Felts. There were 18 members. By the next year, a faculty director, Franz J. Strahm, was employed, and the band had grown to 30 members. One hundred years later, the internationally renowned WKU Band program serves over 400 students in multiple ensembles as well as the Bowling Green community with the Campus Community Band and the Southern Kentucky Concert Band.

The Southern Kentucky Concert Band at WKU is a community band that was organized by former WKU Director of Bands, Dr. John Carmichael in the summer of 1994. The Summer Twilight Concert Series has occurred every year except in 2020 when the Covid-19 pandemic prevented the band from meeting that summer.
