glass center that stands about two feet tall, so the consecrated Host can be seen from most any pew in the church.

What's next? You kneel and pray silently. This event most times lasts anywhere from one hour to 24 hours, seven days a week,

year-round. Someone must always be in His presence. "The Catholic Church has always offered and still offers the Eucharist in adoration not only during Mass, but also outside of it, reserving the consecrated Host with

the utmost care,




