## Breck County AIM competes in North American Championship

The North American Championship was held in Sparta, Ill., from July 24-28 at the World Shooting Complex, and the Breckinridge County AIM team competed nationally at the Grand competitive against the nation's top shooters.

Each shooter competed in three events. Handicaps are where a shooter is moved back in yardage beginning at the 19-yard line back to the 27-yard line. Doubles are where two clays are thrown at the same time. Singles, shot from the 16-yard line, consist of a two-day 200-round event. Handicaps and doubles are individual events, whereas singles competition is a single and team event combined. Meade County sub-junior shooter Joel Mills and junior shooter Rylan Hardesty joined Breckinridge County for the event.

Breckinridge County had three teams entered in the world shoot with one Junior team — which are high school-aged shooters consisting of Montgomery Moorman, Brayden Carman, Grant Barr, Hunter Smiley, and Logan Arnold, who, with a 931/1,000, placed 21st in Junior Class C.

Breckinridge County's other Junior team, consisting of Caleb Ball, Gabe Martin, Joel Mills, Rylan Hardesty, and Colten Carman, placed 29th with a 915/1,000 in Junior C.

Breckinridge County's Junior Gold team (the college age division), consisting of Dalton Butler, Christian Hinton, Corinne Campbell, William Moorman, and A. Braeden Bryan, had a 909/1,000 placing 7th in Junior Gold D class. One lone shooter shot at his first ever Grand event: Eli Priest, who shot a 150/200.

Breckinridge County had Colten Carman tied for 3rd place in the Junior division with a score of 98/100 while shooting from the 19-yard line. He was tied with 13 other shooters from Wisconsin Hardesty 96/100, Dalton Butler to Oklahoma. He was defeated 94/100, and Joel Mills, Brayden in a shoot off and missed the bronze

"We're playing faster, and we're playing with more confidence because they've put in the work in the weight room," Hottell said.

While the Tigers did lose multi-threat star Lance Poole, who accounted for 19 of the team's 30 touchdowns last season, among others off last season's team, there are several players returning, and Hottell expects to see a more balanced attack.

"We're going to be a lot more multiple and harder to stop," he said. "Last year it was Lance left, Lance right, and he had to carry us because we were so young in our skill positions. We were starting a lot of sophomores around him. Those kids have more experience now."

Junior Jacob Spitzer will start at quarterback after throwing for 524 yards and five touchdowns last season.

"He's a little bit of a multithreat," Hottell said. "He's a little bit different than Lance. He has a developed passing game because it's the position he's grown up playing. He can see the field, but he also can run the ball. We're excited

"Last year we were easy

to stop us because we were so run-oriented," he added. "This year we should be able to keep people on their toes, a little bit.'

Up front, the Tigers have several starters back, including senior tackle Kameron Drane. Hottell said he's started 22 games.

Junior Blake McGuffin is a go-get-it guy." another tackle, and he started every game last season.

At center, senior Landon Shartzer gets the call again as a returning starter with Iosua and Vevesi Worden also starting after seeing plenty of time as freshmen.

"They're 300-plus pounds, they dead lift 500-plus pounds," Hottell said. "They're big ole boys."

"Offensively, I think up front it's the biggest, strongest bunch I've had," he said. "I think we're going to be able to bully some people, something we really haven't had a chance to do up front in a long, long time.'

He said there are eight or nine players "who can help us up front."

Junior Aidan Burnette rushed for 148 yards on 33 carries last season, and he's added about 20 pounds, "and

to have him take the reins. I think with that size he has confidence," Hottell said.

There are several players who will see time at receiver, but 6-foot-3 Paxton Dewitt has the most experience after catching 14 passes for 371 yards and four TDs last

"A pure athletic kid, Paxton Dewitt is 6-3 with a 35-inch vertical," Hottell said. "He's

Many of the same kids who start on offense also get the nod on defense.

"We've got experience there," Hottell said.

Senior Hudson Wrenn returns at linebacker after finishing with a team-leading 64 tackles last season.

McGuffin had 33 tackles, including five tackles for lost yardage, while Dewitt had 20 tackles and four fumble recoveries. Hottell also is counting on

the likes of senior Braylan Pearson, junior Donald Gibson, senior Ethan Howard, sophomore Jon Edge and seniors Joaquin Hernandez and Dillian Kennedy, among others.

The Tigers open the season Aug. 22 at home against Butler County. Breckinridge County plays five of its first seven games at home.
