Man charged with attempted murder in smoke shop shooting

A Bowling Green man has been indicted on an attempted murder charge after police say he fired shots at a man in which he was in a verbal argument.

Jason Brownlee, 21, was indicted on attempted murder in connection to a May 1 shooting.

According to Radcliff police, video footage shows that at 2:58 p.m., Brownlee and another man were engaged in a verbal argument in the parking lot of Smoke Buddy Smoke Shop in Radcliff.

During the altercation, Brownlee pulled a handgun and aimed it at the victim, firing four rounds but missing the victim and striking an occupied home on South Wilson Road, according to his complaint warrant.

Brownlee fled the scene in the back seat of a Kia Forte but was found May 15 and arrested by police.

In addition to the attempted murder charge,

Brownlee also was indicted for first-degree wanton endangerment.

Attempted murder is a Class B felony, punishable by 10 to 20 years in prison, if convicted, while first-degree wanton endangerment is a Class C felony, punishable by 5 to 10 years in prison, if convicted.

Brownlee is \$500,000 cash bond at the Hardin County Detention Center. He is set to appear
