

According to Ashcraft, the incident happened due to an incorrect decision and lapse in judgment of an employee despite having thorough training and experience at the jail.

"This situation underlines the critical importance of maintaining constant vigilance and awareness at all times. It is imperative to never lower your guard," Ashcraft said.

After the escape, an afteraction incident report was developed and distributed to all staff members. The report allows employees to grasp the severity of the situation, address successful actions taken, and highlight potential areas of improvement.

To enhance the facilities operations, Ashcraft and her team have increased the number of required annual training hours and committed to ongoing and continuous training.

Ashcraft explained that despite thoroughly training employees, challenges arise due to high turnover rates at the detention center.

She reported that a number of staff are leaving their jobs in the corrections department, mainly to earn a higher pay rate, and that the Shelby detention center employees earn some of the lowest salaries compared to all other positions under the Shelby County Fiscal Court.

According to minutes from the Shelby County fiscal court, the average pay rate for deputy jailers is \$19 an hour. Compared to other Fiscal Court-approved corrections department positions, such as lieutenant, which averages around \$21 per hour, deputy sheriff averages \$30 per hour,

and Sergeant positions average \$20.59 per hour, the deputy jailer position is a low pay rate.

These committed, sworn peace officers are the first responders to emergencies within the facility, including medical crises and fights,' said Ashcraft, "over the course of a year, three staff members sustained broken noses, and one required surgery and reconstruction."

Ashcraft explained that working with insufficient staff is often a significant challenge at the jail. Hiring highly trained, experienced professionals because they can't afford to take a pay cut to join the team.

Ashcraft highlighted the positive initiatives taking place at the jail, such as GED programs, secure ID and Social Security cards, and programs to help inmates reenter society as productive citizens.

"I am deeply devoted to my role as jailer and feel a strong sense of purpose, believing I am here to enact positive change," said Ashcraft, in her first full term as the elected jailer. "My hope is that one day the incredible value of our employees will be widely recognized and appreciated, leading to compensation that reflects both their hard work and the important positions they hold."
