Players — and even umpires double as entertainers throughout the game. It's not unusual for a batter to belt a home run and then lead the crowd in a dance, or for an umpire to break into a moonwalk after a strikeout call. The cast of characters also includes a senior citizen dance squad and the beloved "Banana Baby" ritual: each night, one infant from the crowd is hoisted aloft in a banana costume, a lighthearted nod to The Lion King that has become a fan-favorite tradition.

The result is an atmosphere more akin to a festival than a ballgame. Louisville's Slugger Field was filled to capacity, with some fans traveling from as far as Florida to catch the action. Louisville Bats president Greg Galiette noted that the three games in Louisville in 2024 "were an incredible success with the ballpark packed all three nights," and anticipation for the return engagement proved justified as the Party Animals delivered on the promised fun.

Even amid the comedy, the players' competitive fire showed — home runs and diving catches still drew roars from the crowd. Many attendees said the constant energy — with no long pauses between innings and players mingling with fans — made it more entertaining than a traditional nine-inning game.

This Louisville stop was part of the nationwide Banana Ball World Tour, which now heads to Pennsylvania, where the Party Animals will face a new opponent, the Texas Tailgaters. With each tour stop, the greatest show in baseball continues to grow its fan base, converting newcomers with a fast, familyfriendly spectacle that proves the national pastime can be a little bit bananas.

The Party Animals summed up their Louisville experience with a message to fans:

"Louisville... you brought the PARTY! From rocking out to Teenage Dirtbag' with Jake Skole to recreating viral videos with Jake Lialios, you matched our energy at every turn. You partied like pros. Consider this our unofficial request to run it back next year."

he might've gone under his PR of 53.2," said Sanderlin. Janes ended day one with 2,564 points, nearly 10% above his target and on pace to break 5,000 for the first

Meanwhile, Wheeldon set personal bests in the in the long jump with a leap 12 feet. of 16-11.25, worth 413 decathlon points. He shaved 0.07 seconds off his 400meter PR, clocking in at 55.38 to finish day one with 2,356 points — about 3% ahead of plan.

"Austin helped me a lot," Janes said. "It was great having someone I know and am close with to train and things easier than doing it alone."

On day two, both athletes started strong, going under their projected times in the 110-meter hurdles. Janes ran a personal best of 17.49

seconds, beating his pre- in 4:34. Wheeldon followed vious mark by 0.65 seconds and winning his heat. The time ranks eighth all-time in Collins program history.

The discus proved difficult for both athletes, falling short of targets, but they rebounded in the pole vault. Janes cleared 12-3.75 to place sixth, while Wheeldon set a new PR of 12-7.5 to take fourth.

> Heading into the final event — the 1,500-meter run — Sanderlin made adjustments due to the heat, with temperatures reaching 91 degrees. Confident in his athletes' endurance, he instructed them to work together for at least the first two laps of the race.

Justin Lawrence of the early lead, but Janes moved to the front after 350 meters, with Wheeldon close behind. Janes increased the pace with laps of 1:15 and 1:12 before closing the final 300 meters in 51 seconds to win

closely with a 53-second final 300 to finish second.

Janes' two-day total of 5,094 points placed him ninth overall, improving his school record by 411 points and ranking seventh on Kentucky's all-time list. Wheeldon's final score of 4,568 is the third-best decathlon performance by a sophomore in state history and ranks 11th all-time.

"I could not have asked for a better ending, Sanderlin said. "To see both of my athletes go 1-2 in the 1,500 and dominate that heat was a special moment."

Reflecting on his second decathlon, Janes said, "The competition was great. Being around such amazing athletes pushed me to do better. I could've improved in a few events, but overall it was a great experience."

As he looked back on his time with the Running Titans, Janes offered this takeaway: "Life isn't easy. You just have to persevere and be resilient, no matter how many hard things come vour wav."
