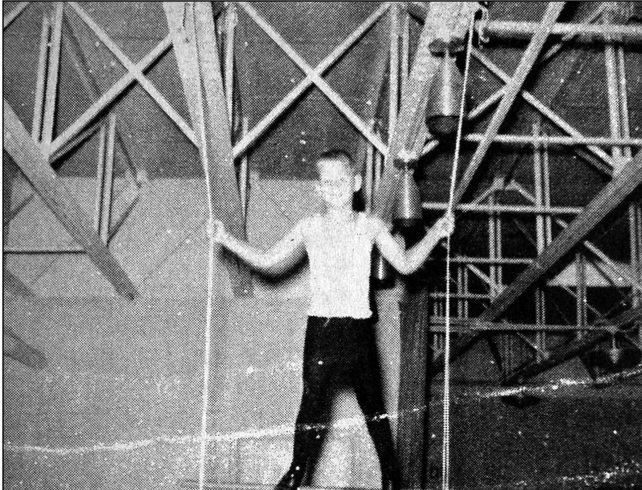

to explain the staff report and the planning office's recommendation regarding the development. He began by stating that the commission feels as though the zone change request and planned development do not agree with the comprehensive plan. Libke noted that the property is not located in the urban services boundary and that the only way it can be amended is if the comprehensive plan is amended. Libke stated that when the property was annexed, the city had a choice to agree to keep the land zoned the way it was previously, or to send a recommendation for change to the commission. Libke stated that the City Council decided

to keep the land as agricultural. Members of the public then took to the podium to voice their opinions on the matter. "People have the right to quiet and peaceful enjoyment on their property; they can't do that with a warehouse right beside them," said Shelby County resident John Davis. "We have to keep the balance between agricultural, industrial, and business," said Shelby County resident Katherine Snyder. "Development always leads to more development," said Shelby County resident Leslie Brown McBride. The last member of the public to speak had a differing opinion. "Money has to come from somewhere; this county needs to be run like a business," said Shelby County resident Bob Dorgan.

After much deliberation, information, and public comment, the Triple S Planning Commission unanimously agreed to reject the zone change request. Libke explained that from here, the recommendation will go to the Shelbyville City Council, and they will have 21 days to either give notice to the commission

that they are making a decision on the recommendation or a member of the public has to write a letter to the council stating they would like a decision to be made. Once either of those things happen, the council will have 90 days to make its decision. If no notice is given or no letter is written after 21 days, the

recommendation stands as given by the planning commission. The public is invited to

the next Triple S Planning Commission meeting on Sept. 16 at 6:30 pm at the Stratton Community Center.
