The Breckinridge County Fair Board met and agreed to build a combination Grandstand and Merchants Building at the Fairgrounds this year. Present plans call for a building one hundred feet long to face the ball diamond. Primarily it will be a grandstand with the seats covered. Underneath the seats and facing the opposite direction will be the merchants booths and room for the concessions. There will also be a covered walkway 10 feet wide running the length of the building in front the booths.

Pfc. Joseph William Grause, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph William Grause, who was killed in action in Korea, Nov. 27, 1950, has been posthumously awarded the Bronze Star Medal with "V" Device for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy. 1875, and that as far back as he can remember, his father, Alfred Miller, was a constant subscriber to The Breckinridge News. He further says that when he left his paternal home and established his present home over fifty years ago, "The Breckinridge News has been a consistent visitor in my home."

Goshen Baptist Church was founded in 1808 and has been rebuilt and moved several times. The last time about 1905 or 1906 when the present church was built at Glen Dean. During all this time so far as we know there have been only two of the members gone out as ministers. The first was Rev. Jimmie Lewis. The first sermon he preached at old Goshen, in a woodland near the bridge which gets its name from the church, is Goshen Bridge, was preached about 1896. Now we have another, James Earl Clark, who has the distinction of being the first minister to be ordained by Goshen Church.

The Irvington plant of the American Pelletizing Corporation, located approximately two miles northwest of Irvington on Route 477, adjacent to the Kentucky Stone Company, is unique. It is the only industry of its kind in the world at the present time, since it is the only one that is "pelletizing" limestone. It also represents a success story for plant supervisor Paul Mattox; the pelletizing process cuts down limestone dust pollution in the environment; and the process has proven to be a boon to fertilizer and to lawn and garden industries, for which limestone is essential.

Employing tenured teachers and administrative personnel was the main order of business for the Breckinridge County Board of Education. A list of 82 teachers on continuing contract, or tenure, was approved, while 19 additional teachers were granted tenure.

The supply of home canning lids for 1976 will be almost double the amount produced last year. Norma Butler, Executive Director, Breckinridge County ASCS, said that a majority of the canning lid manufacturers supplied figures indicating that more than 4 billion replacement lids will be available for the 1976 home canning season. This compares with just over 2 billion produced last year. The increase for 1976 is due to additional lines placed into production by the traditional canning lid manufacturers, plus the entry of new manufacturers in the market.



Following an executive session at their regular meeting, the Breckinridge Board of Education unanimously approved entering into a new four-year contract with Superintendent Janet Meeks. The contract will run through June 30, 2020. Meeks' base salary will be \$131,588 and includes a one percent raise.

During the Hardinsburg City Council monthly meeting, Veronica Ent came before the council to discuss the Vietnam Memorial Wall that is coming to Hardinsburg June 15-19. The wall is coming from Texas, and the current plan is to have it travel through Cloverport and Irvington before parking in Hardinsburg.

County residents were treated to sunshine and warm temperatures early in the week. The thermometer at Meade County RECC in Hardinsburg approached 80 degrees on March 15.

Local community members representing the job force of Breckinridge County gathered in the Breckinridge County High School Library to discuss a new mentor program. It would bring successful business men and women from a variety of fields into the school to discuss what they had to do to get their job and what that job entails. Breckinridge County High School principal Nick Carter said that the program would start next year and was still in development.

Commissioner of Agriculture Ryan Quarles is crisscrossing the Commonwealth to encourage Kentucky motorists to make a voluntary \$10 donation to the state Ag Tag Fund when they buy or renew their farm vehicle license plates. The donation is divided equally among Kentucky 4-H, Kentucky FFA, and the Kentucky Department of Agriculture for promotional programs such as Kentucky Proud.
