Charles Adrian Gray, 80

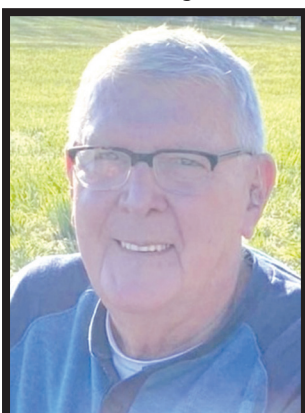
Charles Adrian Gray, 80, of Shepherdsville, passed away on Monday, September 18, 2023 at his home.

Those taxes are paid to the county clerks office.

In other business:

*With no discussion, the council voted 4-2 to approve a pair of adjoining rezoning requests on Cedar Grove Road.

The rezoning would change Agricultural property to IL Light Industrial.

A project which was altered to meet with concerns of the community drew protest once again at the planning commission. However, only two individuals spoke in opposition at the council meeting.

Each tract was about 22 acres. The rezoning was approved with restrictions that there would be no access on Cedar Grove Road and existing trees would remain with additional buffering on the eastern side.

The entrance to the single warehouse would be from Park Look Road.

Paula Mangus and Bonnie Enlow voted against both rezonings.

*Cortney Burden announced that U of L Heath had committed \$100,000 toward an all-inclusive playground planned for the city park.

She said the health care provider would be involved in various activities in the city. And

she said others are also expressing an interest to be partners.

Cubero said that park benches can be sponsored for the park improvements.

*Police chief Steve Schmidt said that residents should be prepared to see more speed patrol on city streets.

He said more officers are patrolling to slow down motorists.

*Public Works foreman Tom LaFollette thanked Lynn Cubero and Mangus for providing lunch for the city crew recently.

He also thanked jailer Bryan Whittaker for providing 2-4 inmates daily to work on projects. LaFollette said the

inmates nearly double the size of the city's public works crew.

Praise was also given to Robert Watkins and the county road department for their work on city projects. He said the partnership with the county, as well as the state, has been excellent on getting roads repaired.

Under an interlocal agreement, Cubero said the county supplies the equipment and labor and the city pays for material.

The next meeting of the Shepherdsville City Council will be on Monday, Sept. 25, at 6:30 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

the next higher one-tenth of one cent per one hundred dollars.

In other words, the 11.194-cent tax rate set by the council was actually .11194 cents per \$100. As a result, Compton said the rate should be rounded up to 11.2 cents, or .112 per \$100, matching the statute's definition.

The council agreed, with a new vote unanimously setting the city's new real property rate set at 11.2 cents. That rate will be included in the second reading of the ordinance during the second special meeting.

For the personal property, motor vehicle/

watercraft and public service company rates, Compton said the numbers could increase or decrease at the council's discretion, though they all needed to be set at the same number.

He mentioned that

the rates had remained the same, set at 18 cents, for a number of years. The council agreed to keep the new rates at 18 cents.

The public hearing regarding all city tax rates is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 25, 6

pm, at the Hillview Government Center. A special city council meeting to approve the tax rate ordinances will follow the public hearing at 6:30 pm. The public is invited to both the public hearing and special meeting.

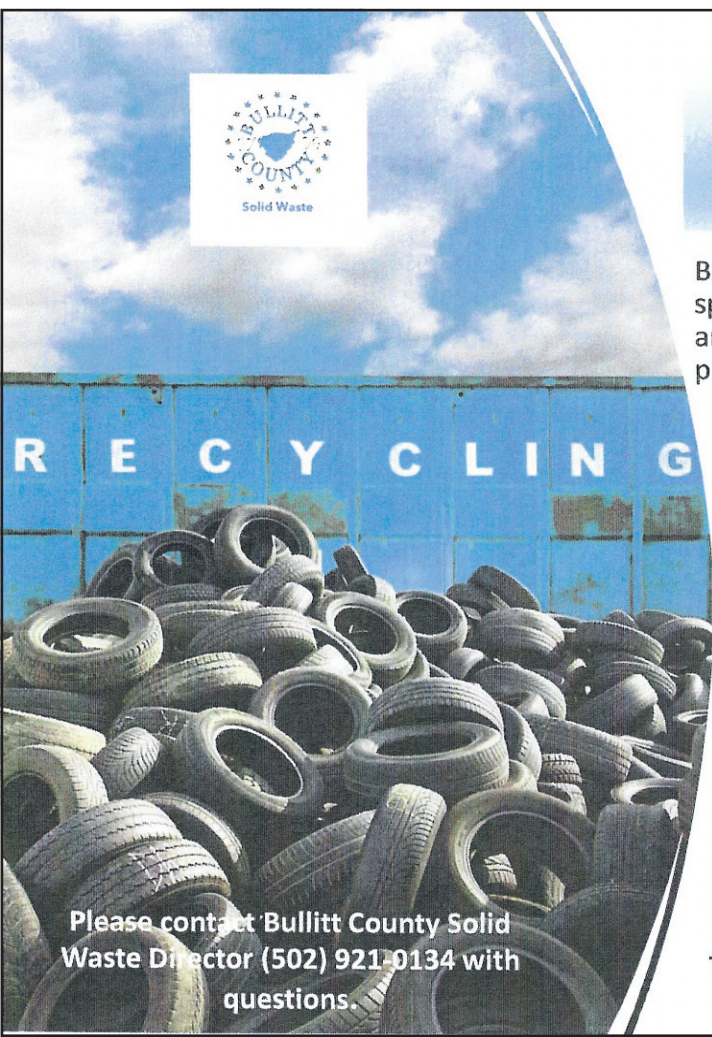
