GIS Department Lead Service Line Review Presented

Scottsville City Council meeting was called to order for business with Mayor David Burch presiding at 9 a.m. Monday, Oct. 14, 2024 in the City Council room. All council members answering roll call as present.

Meeting minutes of September 9, 2024 regular meeting were approved with no corrections or additions.

Scott Dobler, director for Geographic Information System (GIS), reviewed members of the Council with data collected and mapping of Scottsville's water service lines. GIS is a technology that is used to create, manage, analyze, and map all types of data. GIS connects data to a map, integrating location data. Dobler related water line mapping plats has created updated data for meters and values location. Mapping and reporting water lead service lines as mandated by Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is due Wednesday, Oct. 16, 2024.

The waterline data includes specific line material for meters and city lines as well as the customer line material attached to the meter. Water quality may be impacted by many different sources and types of pollution. Water quality standards support efforts to achieve and maintain protective water quality conditions.

Under the Clean Water Act, Kentucky must adopt water quality standards to protect, maintain and improve the

quality of our nation's surface waters. These standards set the appropriate level of protection. Water quality standards are important because they help water quality managers protect and restore the quality of Kentucky surface waters.

Dobler expressed the streamlining work from paper maps to digital enhances employee production on site as well as safety of staff and the public. The compilation of the data has been an asset for departments in filling reports for state agencies and EPA, with Scottsville receiving attention as a model for other entities as well.

The future GIS for Scottsville will be data compilation for storm water infrastructure mapping as well as gas meter documentation and mapping.

Chief of Police, Darren Tabor, reported a 4.4 percent decrease in calls of service for September amounting to 924 and including 128 traffic stops, 27 non-injury accidents, 12 juvenile complaints, 28 motorist assist, 11 welfare checks, seven injury accidents, 10 theft reports and 203 extra patrol.

Chief Tabor also reported the quarterly Allen County-Scottsville Crime Task Force included 260 surveillance details with 47 cases opened. Value of Drugs confiscated was \$16,265 with 13 felony arrests and 12 citations.

City Superintendent report included the completion of lines to Graystone Complex and the second Monday recycling curbside pick up completed.

Also noted was the White Plains Roadside Park shelter was nearing completion and waiting on roofing material. The park is being accessed a lot since the renovation during the last year.

Transit Director Kerry Harwood reported travel of 2,426 miles for 20 days of service in September. Passenger average was 40 per day with a total of 452 morning and 349 afternoon ridership.

Kentucky State of Transportation, Brandon Pittman, Federal Program Specialist, completed the annual bus inspection as a part of compliance review.

Pittman noted the driver's organization and attention to detail in maintenance of buses was commendable and everything was in really good shape.

Paperwork has also been reviewed by the State Transportation Office. Harwood noted a bus would be at Allen County Public Library Tuesday, Oct. 15 sharing information of public transportation for the home schooling program.

Scottsville Wastewater Treatment Plant reported 21,910,000 gallons treated with one load of 8.89 tonnage pressed and hauled to Glasgow Landfill. Pump checks performed at the plant

amounted to 240 and performed at pump stations were 1,260. Process control tests performed were 1,424 with 60 analytical test conducted in a certified laboratory. Monthly flow, discharge and operators reports were completed and sent to the state.

Scottsville Fire Department answered 23 calls of service during September including three structure fires and five wrecks.

Mayor Burch reiterated Monday, Oct. 14 through Friday Oct. 18 is curb side junk pick-up week and the city office is receiving calls for the pick-up service.

Loose leaf zone pick up is currently being published with time schedules for the city service.

Mayor Burch announced the first electric auto charging station is being planned for the city parking lot on East Maple Street behind Allen County Extension Service. Prospects for two stations are planned with room for future expansion. The \$300,000 cost for development will be granted with Tennessee Valley Authority, Tri-County Electric Membership Corporation and Tennessee Tech University.


