Free dumping is available at the Crittenden County Convenience Center from 8 a.m., to 3:30 p.m., Thursday and Friday, May 16-17, and 8 a.m., to noon Saturday, May 18.

Counting cicadas yet?

An anticipated cicada invasion is blooming. Thousands of the insects have been spotted in Crittenden County based on a query made on our social media platforms. Others confirmed sightings range throughout west Kentucky and well beyond to other states in the Southeast, Midwest and Upper Midwest. You can track the emergence using the cellphone app Cicada Safari. This year's brood of the 17-year cicada is emerging si multaneously with the 13-year brood. This co-emergence hasn't occurred in 221 years and won't happen again until 2245. The bugs' arrival is typically triggered when soil temperature reaches 64 degrees at a depth of 8 inches. Screeching sounds made by mating males can be very loud. You're probably already hearing their rhythmic hum. The bugs are harmless to humans and pets and wild animals feast on them.

Through Kinship Care, Walker receives less state assistance than families who serve as foster parents. As a result, she used savings from her 401k to purchase furniture, clothing and other necessities for the children when they were placed in her home on a moment's notice in

With the help from her family, friends, and former co-workers, she took on the role of Mom to three youth whose lives were turned upside down, affected emotionally from an abrupt re-

any way and be a positive influence for them and break generational cycles," Walker said. "I thought, 'Here are these helpless children who have been in a situation they didn't ask to be in,' so I knew I would try to do anything to help them, there was never any doubt that I would."

Walker was awarded permanent custody in January 2021. Today, the youngsters see their father, who Walker says is working and doing well, as frequently as their schedules allow.

Floyd watched in admiration as her sister began managing her new family's physical and emotional needs while working a full-time job with the State of Kentucky.

"This journey I've been on has been a struggle and overwhelming, but it has been a blessing," Walker said. "They've touched my heart and made it even bigger because of the love I have for them."

Franchising commercial garbage set for this fall

fall, County will enter into an exclusive franchise agreement with a commercial garbage collection provider.

The move could mean local businesses will need to switch providers as only one will be licensed to operate inside the county.

County officials believe that by franchising commercial garbage collection, it will create a more uniform, better consumer environment with consistent pricing and service for all.

Right now, Crittenden County does not have an exclusive franchise agreement with a commercial operator. Businesses are free to negotiate details of service and pricing with any collection agency that provides services to the area. There are at least three operating in the county right now.

Early last year, the county announced that beginning October 2024, it would enter into an exclusive agreement one commercial provider. It already provides exclusive franchising for residential garbage pickup. Impact Waste currently has those rights after winning a five-year contract through a competitive bid process last year. Impact's bid was lower than GFL Environmental, which had provided local residential collection for almost 20 years.


Providers are increasingly demanding an opportunity for exclusive agreements, particularly in small, rural counties like Crittenden where transportation and other expenses can create remarkably thin margins.

The commercial franchise will be structured so that it runs contractually concurrent with the county's residential franchise, began early this year.

Bids will be accepted sometime in June for commercial service, and the new franchise agreement will

begin Oct. 1. County Judge-Executive Perry Newcom says some commercial businesses that generate a low volume of trash and are able to subscribe to residential collecusing a 96-gallon


