Lawmakers send budget, investment bill to governor

After almost two years of spending plan that balances the state's current needs and Kentucky General Assembly is sending a two-year, \$128.4 billion spending plan and a \$2.7 billion one-time investment bill to Governor Andy Beshear. The budget continues our commitment to education, infrastructure. public safety, and human services. The two-year spending plan includes record funding for K-12 public schools, and strategic investments in public safety, infrastructure, and health lion funding over the bienservices. HB 6 also includes major investments in mental health and substance abuse recovery, and programs serving our most vulnera-

represents the largest portion of our budget and we made every attempt to get funding to the level closest to students. The education investments included in HB 6 represent the largest increase in funding since the passage of the Kentucky Ed-Act ucation Reform (KERA). The final version of the bill includes a provision that encourages school districts to utilize additional SEEK resources to provide raises for certified and classified staff.

- o An increase in SEEK funding by 3% in the first fiscal year, and 6% in the next fiscal year for a total of \$612 more per pupil over the two-year period.
- Funding to cover 90% of transportation costs in FY 25, and fully fund the costs in FY 26.
