Madison marks American Cruise Lines' inaugural port of call

4 Ohio River cruises planned this year, 11 in 2025

The inaugural port of call by American Cruise Lines in Madison was marked by the arrival of two riverboats — the American Melody and the paddle wheeler American Heritage — on Friday at the boat ramp on the Ohio

"We're thrilled to have American Melody and American Heritage together in Madison for the first time to mark the start of our bright future together," said Charles B. Robertson, president and CEO of American Cruise Lines. "We believe strongly in the tourism potential of the Ohio River and are grateful for a partnership to build tourism infrastructure in your community. We want our riverboats to celebrate Madison and each of the Ohio River towns for years to come."

The event comes just five months after American Queen Voyages (AQV) shut down operations. AQV had been docking boats at Madison for many years, and was in the midst of a five-year agreement before the company's bankruptcy and shut down seemingly left the city without any riverboat visits this summer. But shortly after that, the AQV fleet was purchased by American Cruise Lines, and in June the announcement was made that American Cruise Lines would begin bringing boats to Madison.

"This is a beautiful place in Madison, Indiana, and sometimes doors open and doors close," said Tony Steinhardt, the city's economic development director. "As you all know, we announced a few years back

door closed, but what I can tell you is that we went to work to find another cruise line that wanted to be here in Madison, Indiana. We are so fortunate that Charlie (Robertson) and his team at American Cruise Lines have chosen Madison today."

The docking of two boats together is a rarity for American Cruise Lines, something that last happened in September 2022 when the riverboats American Symphony and American Melody docked at River Heritage Park in Davenport, Iowa.

American Cruise Lines, the largest river cruise line in the United States, has pledged to visit Madison three more times this year with the American Heritage returning Aug. 2, Aug. 16 another partnership, and that and Aug. 30. ACL is then sched-

uled to dock 11 times in Madison in 2025.

Steinhardt said each visit will be an influx of tourism dollars, with an average spend of approximately \$27,000 per visit in direct tourism revenue coming into Madison. He also noted that ACL's boats will be docking "longer than we've ever had boats" with 12- to 15-hour port of calls compared to the more brief stops AQV has made in the past.

"They'll get to experience Madison morning, noon and night. We're excited about that. We're excited our guests get to experience what we experience in Madison, Indiana," Steinhardt

"We are a community with a proud river heritage, and there's just something that evokes nos-

river community when these riverboats show up in our port,' Director Andrew Forrester. "Seeing them here on such a beautiful day is such an amazing thing for Madison, and we're excited to have them back.

"We're also excited about the Lines, creating premium experiences for the guests, and it's beneficial for the guests to see all the things Madison has to offer, but also serve our restaurants, our retail stores and historic properties really well," Forrester added. "These visits are important for our economy because the impact they have, and the amount of money that is impacted in our community, and we know once visitors come to see Madison, just once, you'll want to come back and get a little bit bigger

taste of Madison." Madison Mayor Bob Courtney said having the riverboats stop in Madison is more than just economic impact. It's a treat for local residents and Madison's other visitors.

"I've been watching steamboats and cruise ships dock along our riverfront ever since I was a small kid living downtown. The excitement today is same as it was when I was a small kid," Courtney said.

Madison has always been known as a beautiful river town. We are so proud of that heritage" in which riverboats have long been a part of the city's history."

Courtney also read a letter from Indiana Destination Development Corporation Secretary and Chief Executive Officer Elaine Bedel who noted, "Once visitors disembark in Indiana and experience the unique charm of Madison, we are confident they will be captivated and eager to the destinations do the talking."

> American Cruise Lines was founded in 1972 by Robertson's parents, Charles A. and Carol Robertson. Charles A. Robertson died Feb. 9, 2020, and after that Charles B. Robertson assumed his current role. "We have 20 ships across our country, and seven more under construction right now, so we will continue to expand our footprint all over America," he said.

> "Indiana has been so welcoming to us. This is the first cruise investment that's coming into the state of Indiana, and the first cruise terminal that we're really discussing on the Ohio River. It is so ready for increased tourism traffic on this river system. It's a great way to see our country."

Robertson noted the company began operation as a ship builder and American Cruise Lines continues to build its own ships. "We're very proud to do it, to manufacture them here in America with American steel with engines and generators, some of which come from Indiana, and every where we go, we strive to keep our ships efficient, keep them small, and really let
