DCA's Mbugua heads girls All-Area team for second straight year

Contributing Writer race Mbugua, who became one of the most dominant players ever in this area as she led Danville Christian to its most successful season to date, has been voted The Advocate-Messenger Area Girls Basketball Player of the Year for the second consecutive year.

Mbugua was the top vote-getter in exclusive balloting of area coaches for The Advocate-Messenger 2024-25 All-Area Girls Basketball Team, prevailing in an extremely close race for player of the year.

Mbugua, a 6-5 junior who signed with Louisville in November, finished in the top 10 in the state in rebounding and the top 15 in the state in scoring as she led DCA to a 27-8 record, the All "A" Classic championship, a second consecutive 12th Region championship and the semifinals of the Girls

She was named the 12th Region Player of the Year by the Kentucky Association of Basketball Coaches and was a McDonald's All American Game nominee.

She averaged 22.3 points and 12.7 rebounds over 23 games after returning from an offseason 54.7 percent from the field and 74.6 percent from the free throw line.

She had 70 points, 43 rebounds and 14 blocked shots in three state tournament games, and she finished her high school career with 2,519 points and 1,818 rebounds. Mbugua edged Alexys

Boyle baseball team eager for offense to ignite

seven-run inning isn't that uncommon in high school baseball, but it was big news for Boyle County earlier this week.

The Rebels scored more runs in the second inning Monday than they had gotten in any of their previous eight games, and they were hoping that was an indication that their offense was about to get un-

Offense has been an issue for Boyle in the early weeks of the season, but sound pitching and defense have allowed the Rebels to win as many as they've lost.

And they believe the big inning and the double-digit score they put up in an 11-3 rout of Rockcastle County could be a sign of better days ahead at the

"It's definitely a confi-

Austin Bodner said.

Bodner sent a 359-foot bomb over the right-field fence at Centre College's Gary Wright Field for the big blow in Boyle's big inning Monday. It was his second home run and only the third of the season for the Rebels. (Collin Wise has the other.)

Boyle totaled nine hits including two each by Kyler Claunch and Logan Perry - which was well above its season average of 5.8 as it raised its scoring average from 4.8 runs per game to 5.4.

Coach Adam Blair said one good day at the plate didn't mean the Rebels were over their early-season slump - they were held to three runs two days later in a 4-3 loss at Scott County that dropped them to 6-6 - but he said it's a pretty good start.

in certain situations, and today was the day that they put it together," Blair said. "And I told them, 'We've got to keep building on

Blair said he isn't worried about whether the offense will come around, though the Rebels have been shut out twice and have been held to three runs or less seven times so

"We've not gotten timely hits, and we've faced some good pitching," he said.

The lineup has been heavily overhauled following the loss of 10 seniors to graduation last year, and Blair said he knew it would take time for some players who batted primarily in junior varsity games before this season to make the transition to the varsity

"They're adjusting and learning how to change their approach, because the velocity is a little bit were (striking out) a lot early on, and we've just been working constantly on our approach and on our two-strike approach and about just putting the ball in play."

Meanwhile, pitching and defense have carried the day, as Boyle allowed three runs or less in eight of its first 11 games.

"Our defense has been super solid, and our pitching has been really good," Blair said. "We've lost one-run games, two-run games, three-run games."

Boyle's team earned-

run average was at 2.30 after the win over Rockcastle, and starting pitchers Caeden Patterson - who earned the win against the Rockets - Landon Parness and Claunch were all well below 2.00. And they have been backed by a defense that gives up few extra

"We have really good speed, and we've got really good defensive kids, and ... that's kept us in those one-run ballgames," Blair


Bodner said team chemistry is also an asset
