Since taking the job in 2016 season, I can't remember a Wildcat team with less on-field experience coming into a season than this 2025 version. We have a talented roster of strong upperclassmen and young up-and-coming talent, but we are an inexperienced team nonetheless. We lost nearly 700 at bats and 130 innings pitched off a 26 win team. I knew we

would have growing pains. After a very slow start to the season, the Wildcats have reeled off four straight wins and are winners of 5 of our last 7 contests.

The latest on Tuesday was a 12 hit performance at Fleming County (10-10).

Pitching has been a strength. With a team ERA of 3.24, we have stayed in games all season. It was not until the last 10 days that the bats have started to heat up.

After losing to four good opponents in Florida then returning to play Rowan close twice, we have seen major growth from the bats.

Seniors Zane McCarty (.403) and Colten Carpenter (.327) lead the team in hitting.

Memphis Beadle has a team best 1.90 ERA with a minimum of 10 innings pitched.

Beadle, Mason Dillon, and Preston Roussos each have two pitching wins,

and Dillon leads the staff with 28k's.

We look to finish this week strong as we will travel to Jackson City, West Carter, and Jackson County.

I enjoy this team because we are seeing them learn on the job. Guys will continue to make mistakes, but seeing them learn from them and perform is really a rewarding thing for me.
