In the past decade, we've gained the ability to use Non-Traditional Instruction (NTI) days when bad weather strikes. These virtual learning days give us more options instead of relying solely on traditional snow days, which must be made up by lengthening the school calendar. NTI days do not need to be made up, but we are only allowed to use up to 10 in a school year. When we consider using NTI, we want to ensure that power or won't create barriers for students to complete their work from home.

The Lawrence County Board of Education held its regular meeting at Lawrence County High School in the library on Monday, Dec. 16, 2024, at 6 p.m. Board members Jim See (Chairman), Maddlene Roberts (Vice-Chair), Barbara Robinson, Garnett Skaggs, and Susie Rice were all present in person. Mr. See called to order the meeting. The board approved the agenda.

The agenda was amended to allow Marshall University students to perform their externships within the LC School District.

In students and staff presentations and recognitions:

Mr. See, Ms. Robinson, and Mrs. Rice were sworn in as elected LC Board members for a 4-year term. Mr. See has served on the board for 19 years. Ms. Robinson has served on the board for 28 years. And Mrs. Rice has served on the board for 3 years. We appreciate our board members' service to our schools.

Schools will resume their spotlights in January of 2025; LEES- January; LWES- February; BES-March and LMS- April.

In communications, Mrs. Webb gave the Superintendent update: The LCHS held the Senior Breakfast, which the Louisa Free Will Church hosted.
