Status hearing is May 21.

Gregory S. Jones was charged with assault on a sports official, and controlled substance prescription not in original container. Status hearing is June 11.

Steven Lasean Kelsey was charged with fourth-degree assault child abuse, and third-degree criminal trespassing. Discovery deadline is June 4, status hearing is June 25.

Michael L. Magnan was charged with operating on suspended

or revoked operators license, failure to produce insurance card, no or expired Kentucky registration receipt, and failure of owner to maintain required insurance. Status hearing is June 25.

state regulation.

Special purpose vehicles include all-terrain vehicles (ATVs), utility terrain vehicles (UTVs), mini trucks, pneumatic-tired military vehicles and full-size special purpose-built vehicles. Low-speed vehicles as defined in KRS 186.010 are not included in SB 63.

To be a street-legal special purpose vehicle, the vehicle must be equipped with essential safety features, be registered, insured and pass an inspection. SB 63 establishes a \$10 annual registration fee and a \$25 fee for the certified inspection, to be paid to the sheriff's office prior to titling.

The new law prohibits these vehicles on interstates and parkways and prohibits traveling more than 20 miles on a highway

displaying centerline pavement markings.

Vehicles primarily used for farm or agricultural activities are exempt from being classified as street-legal special purpose vehicles.

Magistrates reviewed the \$1,000 Fireworks Permit Ordinance fee enacted last year with considering lowering the fee to \$500. With the upcoming June season, the ordinance regulates vendor set up, safety and operation within Allen County over a short period of time. Magistrates approved the reduction of fee to \$500 with a second reading at the next Fiscal Court meeting.

Magistrates passed the employee insurance renewal with a 10 percent increase over last year rate. Originally an 18 percent increase was planned before

negotiations were reviewed for renewal.

Magistrates passed liability, structures and workman compensation insurance renewals at \$345,242 with Kentucky Association of Counties (KaCO). The increase over 2024 rates amounted to about \$20,000.

Gary Petty, Civil Defense Director, advised the magistrates FEMA has approved a change in application for communications back up at Mt Union facility to Alonzo-Perrytown facility. The Alonzo-Perrytown tower has no back up power in case of outage and could adversely affect operations within Allen County Dispatch Center meeting emergency needs. Magistrates approved the needed revision locally.

Local volunteer fire departments

are evaluating the Insurance Services Office (ISO) rating with a goal of acquiring a six. An ISO fire rating is a score provided to fire departments and insurance companies

INSPECTION PERIOD

FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Allen County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 5 through May 19, 2025. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator (PVA) or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 2025, assessment on which state, county, and school taxes for 2025 will be due about September 15, 2025.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8:00 A.M. and 4:30 P.M. Monday through Friday.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period. Written documentation supporting your opinion of value will continue to be required. However, you will be instructed on the best method to submit your documentation after contacting our office regarding your request to have a conference. More specific instructions regarding how conferences will be held this year are available online at allencountypva.com and will be posted at the entrance to the PVA's office, located at: 201 W. Main St, Scottsville, KY.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period. Please contact the county clerk's office to receive instructions on the method the office is using to accept appeals this year and to obtain a form that can be used to file your appeal.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the property valuation administrator.

- (1) Taxpayer must list under protest (for certification) what they believe to be the fair cash value of their property.
- (2) Taxpayer must file a written protest directly with the Department of Revenue, Office of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Department of Revenue may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.
