"We've had some people just come in to reminisce about days working here at the National Store, or when their grandmother or grandfather did," Wood explained. "They've just done a walk through to remember the time when they were here and a part of it."

Wood explained that the National Store had played a significant role in the city's history by helping the economy, and providing jobs for people, while fostering close relationships among the employees.

Now, the store sells vintage items that

Wood described as "pre-loved," with some being parts of the history of Allen County.

"We actually have things that were a part of the National Store, Charm Beauty Shop, Morton's Department Store, Porter Paint, Marblewood Lumber, J&W Home Center," Wood listed. "We have a lot of local things as well."

Wood added that the items currently in the store belong to her or her family, with the inventory of the store being an accumulation of those storages in one central spot.

The space, consisting of over 5,000 square feet, offers antiques, vintage, thrift, salvage, clothing, furniture, houseware, holiday decorations, toys, books, arts and craft supplies, historic items, including signs from various businesses, and bricks of the Jacksonian, along with several more.

Wood explained that they plan to do a grand opening on a future date, as they have to price their items in the 6,000 square feet of the space.

"We'll continue with Thursdays, and continue to just price and get everything ready for a bigger opening," Wood said. "(We could do) popup days, like if I'm in town and I'm up here, the sign will say open or closed, and if it says open, then come on

The grand opening will be announced at a later time, after each item in the store has been priced.

"For a lot, it's like being able to reconnect and connect those memories, and I just enjoy when people are coming, and hearing the stories of where they worked, what they did, and how they contributed to us as a community,'

Wood added that she hopes to hang pictures of the original store throughout the building, while already having items from the original store, such as a stamp dispenser, an adding machine, a wrapping paper dispenser, along with display tables original to the National Store.

"One of our future goals would be to rent spaces out to other vendors as well," Wood said. "Right now, we already have a waiting list for people who would like to rent a space, so as we sell down inventory that we have, that would be a future goal."

Wood explained that it would be the point of the marketplace to have other people in collaboration to have a store within the space, with a wide variety of possible stores within, whether that be an antique store, boutique, or any other kind of store, with there being 10 people on that waiting list.

A federal funded Schools and Libraries Cybersecurity Pilot Program (Pilot Program) provides up to \$200 million to selected participants over a three-year term to purchase a wide variety of eligible cybersecurity services and equipment.
