Annual APES Program Helps AC-S Juniors Learn Business Practices and Principles

The top academic students in the junior class at the Allen County-Scottsville High School learned about the finer points of the business world as part of the American Private Enterprise System (APES) Program. The 54th annual event was held on consecutive Fridays over a three-week period in November.

Under the guidance of a steering committee of school and community leaders, the students explored eight business-related topics, listened to guest speakers, and toured several local business establishments on the consecutive Fridays of November 7, 14 and 21. The APES program was organized by the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service in Allen County.


