**Blevins joins department**

During the period when the school system is not in session, Deputy Blevins will work as a regular Deputy Sheriff.

**East Kentucky Power** Cooperative to limit rate increase

Serves Clinton County through SKRECC

Attorney General Russell Coleman announced today a proposed settlement with East Kentucky Power Cooperative (EKPC) to preserve affordable and reliable electricity for more than 570,000 Kentucky homes, farms and businesses across 89 counties.

East Kentucky Power supplies power to South Kentucky RECC, which serves Clinton County.

According to the SKRECC annual report in 2024, the local coop spent \$111,139,692 to purchase power from East Kentucky Power that year. The proposed settlement, which must be approved by

the Public Service Commission, protects Kentuckians from double-digit rate increases that are facing families in other parts of the country. According to the settlement terms, residential customers will see an increase of less than \$5 on their monthly bills. EKPC also agreed not to seek another rate increase on families for at least three years. Attorney General Coleman prioritized both keeping

Kentuckians' rate increases as low as possible and preventing another rate increase for multiple years.

According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, the average American residential price for electricity has risen nearly 34% since 2020. Kentucky's residential rate increases are far below the national average, and Attorney General Coleman is fighting to keep double-digit increases out of Kentucky.

"Affordable and reliable energy is Kentucky's competitive advantage, and it's the reason so many families are proud to call the Commonwealth home," said Attorney General Coleman. "This settlement will preserve affordability while also building out our energy capacity to fuel new jobs and economic growth for a generation.'

The proceeds from the settlement will be used to fuel EKPC's bold growth intended to power Kentucky's next chapter. The cooperative is embarking on a \$2 billion capital investment plan that will build two new power stations and will upgrade an existing coal plant to be co-fired with

EKPC is a not-for-profit, rural electric generation and transmission cooperative headquartered in Winchester. It provides services to 16 member cooperatives that cover much of Northern, Central, Southern, and Eastern Ken-

Executive Director of the Attorney General's Office of Rate Intervention John Horne and Assistant Attorney General Larry Cook negotiated the settlement on the behalf of the Commonwealth.

### David was blessed with a Local Red Cross volunteers provide lifeline for families strained by 2025 disasters

In 2025, local volunteers became a lifeline for thousands of neighbors reeling from disasters across the Commonwealth earlier this year.

In a powerful display of community, over 1,500 volunteers responded alongside partners to provide safe refuge, hot meals, emotional support and basic health services for families devastated by back-to-back flooding and tornadoes this spring across Kentucky and Southern Indiana. The Red Cross also distributed more than \$2 million in financial assistance, served over 167,000 meals and snacks, and distributed 93,000 emergency relief supplies to over 25,000 households recovering in 2025 from these disasters.

The need for support shows no sign of slowing down. In the U.S., Red Cross home fire responses spike nearly 20% during the holidays, when families face increased fire risks such as cooking and heating. The Kentucky Red Cross responds to an average of 1,200 home fires a year, in which there is an uptick in November and December months. "Disasters don't take holidays - and neither do our

volunteers," said Nadine McCrindle, CEO, Red Cross Kentucky Region. "Thanks to generous donations, they have the resources to deliver comfort, hope and support to help people recover. Through these simple acts of giving, we come together as a community to bring light to a family's darkest days — right when it's needed most.' This and holiday season, visit redcross.org/KYholiday


