about creating an account. Producers who have the authority to act on behalf of another customer as a grantee via an FSA-211 Power of Attorney form, Business Partner Signature Authority or as a member of a business can now access information for the business in the farmers.gov portal.

GEOSPATIAL ACREAGE REPORTING Acreage reports using precision agriculture planting boundaries can be filed electronically with an approved insurance provider or an authorized third-party provider, who will then share the file with FSA staff. Producers should

notify their local FSA office if they submitted an electronic geospatial acreage report containing precision planting boundaries that they want to use as part of their FSA acreage report. **MORE INFORMATION** For more information, producers can contact



WHEREAS, an annual budget proposal and message has been prepared and delivered to the City Commission; and



WHEREAS, an annual budget proposal and message has been prepared and delivered to the City Commission, and
