

Oregon safari park owner is arrested on drug charges

BANDON, Ore. (AP) Oregon police say they arrested a zoo owner on drug charges following a police raid at the facility earlier this month that resulted in drug seizures and hundreds of animals being relocated.

The Coos County Sheriff's Office said Brian Tenney was arrested Tuesday on charges of methamphetamine possession, manufacturing and attempted distribution. He was released later Tuesday as the district attorney's office awaited more information, a Coos County Jail staff member said when reached by phone Wednesday morning.

On May 15, authorities served multiple search warrants at West Coast Game Park Safari, near the small town of Bandon on the southern Oregon coast.

The action followed an investigation into the facility, including inquiries into the animals' welfare, Oregon State Police said.

Police said they found 80 grams of methamphetamine, 44 firearms, roughly 8 grams of cocaine and \$1.6 million in cash, cashier's checks, bonds and certificates.

Veterinarians and staff with the Oregon Humane Society and the state Departments of Wildlife and Agriculture responded to the scene to assess the animals' health, food quality, water supply, sanitation and enclosure conditions, authorities said.

Police said 310 animals were relocated to animal sanctuaries or rescue facilities. After being evaluated by veterinarians, a camel, a chicken and a kinkajou were euthanized.

The investigation is ongoing.

Police find no evidence of crime after social media allegations

LOUISA The Louisa Police Department posted on social media that it is aware of recent posts regarding allegations of a human trafficking incident at a local hotel in its jurisdiction.

The investigating officer found no evidence of criminal activity.

"We understand the seriousness of such allegations and wish to address the situation with transparency and factual information," LPD posted on Facebook.

On May 25, LPD received a report that a concerned citizen perceived suspicious behavior potentially indicating human trafficking.

The officer "thoroughly assessed the circumstances described," according to LPD.

The investigating officer did not discover evidence of criminal activity that would support charges or justify further investigation, according to LPD.

"There were no signs of trafficking, coercion or unlawful restraint observed during the officer's inquiry," LPD posted. "We will be reviewing the report with the county attorney's office."

LPD also said while it appreciates the vigilance of the community in reporting concerns and that it encourages the public to do so, it asks that individuals avoid spreading unverified or misleading information on social media platforms.

Man charged with burglary, indecent exposure

CATLETTSBURG An Ashland man was scheduled to be arraigned on charges Thursday stemming from an alleged domestic violence assault that neighbors said included indecent exposure.

Timothy Keyser, 43, of Ashland, was arrested May 10 on charges of second-degree burglary, first-degree domestic violence strangulation and first-degree indecent exposure after Kentucky State Police responded to a physical domestic in the 1800 block of Shopes Creek Road in Cannonsburg.

According to the arrest report, a trooper responded to the home after a 911 call and observed the door of the trailer broken off from its hinges, laying in the front yard.

Overhearing yelling from the inside of the home, the trooper gave verbal commands for the individuals to exit the home, resulting in Keyser allegedly exiting the home with his pants around his ankles.

Once Keyser was placed in handcuffs, troopers began speaking

with the female alleged victim and neighbors who claimed the altercation with Keyser began in the yard, where Keyser allegedly grabbed the female victim by the neck before she was able to break free, leading up to Keyser kicking in the front door of her home "and went inside after her," the trooper reported.

Two neighbors also reported that during the altercation, Keyser stood outside the trailer naked "moving his hips in a circular motion" in the direction of the neighbor's 8-year-old daughter.

Another witness told police "the guy was naked and he was screaming at the woman and kept running in the house after her," adding the alleged victim was yelling for someone to call 911 for help.

The alleged victim said Keyser strangled her at one point and said "I will kill you before I go to jail," explaining to police that she couldn't breathe.

Keyser was transported to the Boyd County Detention Center and was later indicted on charges of second-degree burglary, first-degree strangulation and first-degree indecent exposure.

He is held on a \$150,000 cash bond.
