### Sportsplex plans in home stretch

#### **Groundbreaking projected** for early 2026

sports complex at Camp Landing is on track for a groundbreaking early next year.

"We want to build this thing one time," Boyd County Judge-Executive Eric Chaney said.

Commissioner David Salisbury asked

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Chaney for an update at the fiscal court meeting Tuesday.

"We are really excited about it," Chaney said. "We are just finalizing a few details. It'll be a big project, great for the community.'

Chaney said all the funding as been secured for the project.

"We are working on details on the interior

as well as the air dome itself," Chaney said.

Chaney said the geotechnical surveys found the ground to be good for construction and the surveys have been completed.

"Everything is good, we are moving forward," Chaney said. "We are getting close."

Chaney said the groundbreaking should happen in the first quarter of 2026 and construction will take roughly 35 weeks to complete.

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# Bridge closure a newt point

### Salamanders habitat, replacement cost cited for making walking bridge

**CATLETTSBURG** A bridge at the end of Midland Trail in Boyd County is in the process of being made into a walking bridge.

During Tuesday's Boyd County Fiscal Court Meeting, the court voted to close the bridge over Shopes Creek. The bridge is behind Meade Station.

'It's \$100,000 to replace that bridge," Eric said. "It doesn't affect access. ... It won't cut down on emergency service access."

Chaney said the area is accessible from Shopes Creek Road and U.S. 60. The bridge is less than 500 feet from the intersection.

"It will be a walking bridge," Chaney said.

Endangered salamanders have been found in the creek and the state recommended closure of the bridge instead of replacement.

"It's government," Chaney said. "We've got a bridge that needs to be taken care of, but we've got to worry about the salamanders underneath of it."

"Salamanders?" Commissioner Jeremy Hol-

Chaney, judge-executive, brook asked. "This is the first time I've heard salamanders in the court."

"We could have this

discussion for the next four hours and I'd continue to get more and more frustrated," Chaney said. "I just don't get it. It doesn't make any sense to me. Sorry, little salamander."

She said closing was a

difficult decision. "I've prayed over, cried over and thought about it for a long time. For nearly six years, I've poured my heart and soul into this place, into our employees, our guests, and this community that has become like family," she said in her announcement of the closure on Facebook. "It's been the hardest and best thing I've ever done, and I wouldn't trade a single moment of it."

She said she plans to continue to cook.

"I will likely continue catering, especially until the baby comes," she said, noting she is pregnant and due to deliver in April. "But no, I won't reopen. This place took all of my time away from family and I'm ready for a new chapter.

"I am very thankful for the years I had, but I feel very at peace with this decision. Ashland is not a place I would ever reopen in, and I will leave it at that," she said.
