## Drug-, sex-related charges among indictments

**GREENUP** Greenup County's grand jury recently handed up indictments that include a few drugand sex-related charges.

An indictment is not necessarily an indication of guilt, but a grand jury found probable cause from initial evidence to continue felony prosecution.

The following are innocent until proven guilty in a court of law:

• Joseph W. Brown, 39, of Flatwoods, was indicted on a charge of first-degree trafficking in meth, greater than 2 grams.

· Shannon D. Thomas, 41 of Ashland, was indicted on a charge of first-degree meth trafficking.

· Charles Williams, 44, of Greenup, was indicted on a charge of first-degree sexual abuse of a victim under 12.

• Rachel Rowe, 51, of Raceland, was indicted on a first-degree assault charge.

• Gary R. Preston, 81, of Ashland, was indicted on a charge of first-degree sexual abuse of a victim under 12. According to the indictment, the abuse occurred "on or about Oct. 1, 1990. through Nov. 17, 2025."

• Donovan R. Anaman, 40, of Greenup, was indicted on a charge of first-offense failure to comply with sex offender registration.

 Justin Smith, 38, of South Shore, was indicted on a charge of possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.
