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Story **Unfinished: Powell County Confronts Suicide With Hope**

Stanton, Kentucky — At Powell County Lions Club Park, the community recently came together for an event called "Story Unfinished," a day devoted to suicide awareness and prevention. Organized by Christina Smith in honor of her son, Gage, who died by suicide nearly two years ago, the gathering turned a place of everyday recreation into a space of remembrance, resilience, and hope.

The event featured live music, food trucks, face painting, a butterfly release, a "hope wall," and a large memorial banner where friends and families could write the names of loved ones lost to suicide. For Smith, it was a way to transform grief into action, ensuring her son's story lives on by helping others choose life. "Story Unfinished is my love for Gage poured into something that can help oth*ers hold on,*" she said.

A Crisis Close to Home

Suicide is not a distant issue for Kentucky or for Powell County. According to the Kentucky Injury Prevention and Research Center, Powell County recorded 11 suicides among non-veteran residents between 2018 and mid-2024, averaging one to two per year. Because of the county's small size, exact youth numbers are suppressed to protect privacy. Still, the statewide picture is sobering: in 2023, **29 Kentucky youths ages 6–17 died by** suicide, and nearly 1,600 young people sought **hospital care** for intentional self-harm.

National surveys show that nearly **1** in **5** high school students in Kentucky has seriously considered suicide in the past year, and about 1 in 10 has attempted it. Experts say that numbers like these demand attention, especially in rural Appalachian counties where economic hardship, isolation, and lack of mental-health resources make preven-

tion more difficult.

What Drives Youth Suicide?

Suicide is complex, rarely caused by a single factor. For some young people, it stems from untreated depression or anxiety, bullying — including cyberbullying — or family struggles. For others, it can happen suddenly in moments of despair, especially when firearms or medications are easily accessi-

Social media and video games often raise questions for parents. While most teens use these platforms harmlessly, evidence shows that cyberbullying, late-night screen use, and exposure to harmful content online can increase risks. Still, researchers stress that it is the combination of emotional pain, social pressures, and access to lethal means that most often leads to tragedy.

A Community's Role in Prevention

Events like Story Unfinished show that local communities can be powerful allies in prevention. By providing safe spaces to talk openly about grief and mental health, they chip away at stigma and remind young people that they are not alone.

Protective steps are proven to help

- Safe storage of firearms and medications locked, unloaded, and out of reach.
- Connection and belonging at home, school, church, and in activities.
- Open conversations where adults ask directly about suicidal thoughts and listen without judg-
- Quick access to help through schools, counselors, pastors, and hotlines.

A Call To Action

Suicide should never be dismissed as "just talk." Every threat, every expression of hopelessness, must be taken seriously. "As a child growing up, many of us said, 'I'll kill myself,' without meaning it. But today, kids too often act on it quietly," one community member reflected. "It's up to us to listen when they whisper they don't want tomorrow."

Powell County's Story Unfinished event serves as a poignant reminder that, even in the face of grief, we can choose connection, compassion, and prevention. By working together — families, schools, churches, neighbors — we can help ensure that every child's story continues, unfinished only because life still lies ahead.
