PUBLIC NOTICE: ORDINANCE 2025 - 04

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF WARSAW, IN GALLATIN COUNTY KENTUCKY, ADOPTING THE ANNUAL BUDGET FOR THE FISCAL YEAR JULY 1, 2025 THROUGH JUNE 30, 2026, BY ESTIMATING REVENUES AND RESOURCES, AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS FOR THE OPERATION OF CITY GOVERNMENT.

WHEREAS, the Mayor has prepared an annual budget proposal and message and has delivered the budget proposal and message to City Council; and
WHEREAS, the City Council has reviewed the budget proposal and has made necessary and desirable modifications.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WARSAW, IN GALLATIN COUNTY, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That the annual budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025 and ending June 30, 2026, more particularly described in the attached Exhibits, is hereby adopted as attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
SECTION 2: This Ordinance shall be effective as of July 1, 2025.
SECTION 3: The invalidity of any section of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other section.
SECTION 4: This Ordinance may be published in summary according to law.
SECTION 5: The foregoing was read, passed and adopted by the Council of the City of Warsaw, Kentucky, meeting in Special Session on the 20TH day of May, 2025, and in Regular Session on the 9TH day of June, 2025, with 6 yes votes, 0 no votes, and 0 abstentions, and was ordered published in summary according to law.

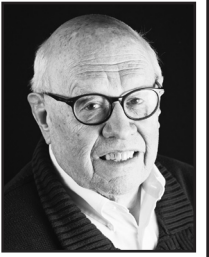

Planting by the Signs June Overview The Rest of June by Phil Case



PBTS NOTE: Half of the year is just a few days from being behind us and now we’re heading into the heart of summer. Meteorologists call June, July and August summer – so that makes July the middle month although, according to the calendar, summer just started last week. Take your pick – whichever designation you choose, it’s HOT. The monthly breakdown follows the Quick Takes beginning with the last days of June through the first three weeks of July.

QUICK TAKES

>June 25-26: VERY fertile, Cancer/breast; above-grounders

>June 27-28: NO PLANTING, killing sign Leo/heart

>June 29-July 3: Flowering signs/no veggies – Virgo/bowels (29-30); Libra/reins (July 1-3)

>July 4-5: VERY fertile, Scorpio/crets, above-grounders

>July 6-12: Fertile, Sagittarius/thighs (July 6-8); Capricorn/knees (9-10); Aquarius/legs (11-12); light moon through most of 10th for above-grounders; dark moon/below-grounders, 11-23.

>MOON CHANGE: Light to dark, July 10, 4:37 p.m.

>July 13-15: VERY fertile, Pisces/feet, below-grounders

>July 16-17: NO PLANTING, killing sign, Aries/head

>July 18-19: VERY fertile, Taurus/neck, below-grounders

JULY OVERVIEW

MOON PHASES: July begins with the moon in the light phase where it continues until the full/dark moon at 4:37 p.m. July 10. The new/light moon returns July 24, 3:11 p.m.

When the light moon is in force, plant above-ground producers and it’s below-ground producers when the dark moon rules.

Don’t plant when either of the killing signs, Aries and Leo, is in force or veggies when the flowering signs Virgo and Libra rule since they are bloom days.

Planting when the fertile signs rule is a viable alternative to the VERY fertile signs, which are Scorpio, Pisces, Taurus, and Cancer. The fertile ones – just a little below VERY fertile - are Sagittarius, Capricorn, and Aquarius.

If you can only utilize one aspect of the system for planting, I would suggest going with the moon phases but still completely avoid the killing signs Aries and Leo and the flowering signs Virgo and Libra for anything but flowers.

THE SIGNS: Check to see if the moon is in the light or dark phase (information above and on any calendar) before planting anywhere, or other moon-related activities. July – like June - begins with flowering signs ruling, so that’s where we will start.

FLOWERING DAYS: Libra/reins, July 1-3, 29-30; Virgo/bowels, July 26-28. Eight days – up from seven in June - with the light moon ruling if you are still planting flowers.

VERY FERTILE DAYS: Scorpio/crets, July 4-5, 31, above-grounders; Pisces/feet, July 13-15, below-grounders; Taurus/neck, July 18-19, below-grounders; and Cancer/breast, July 22-23, below-grounders,. There are 10 days again this month ruled by the VERY fertile signs; only three of them for above-grounders with the light moon in force, 4-5, 31

FERTILE DAYS: Sagittarius/thighs, July 6-8; Capricorn/knees, July 9-10; and Aquarius/legs, July 11-12. There are seven days in July ruled by these three signs. The 6th through most of the 10th find the light moon in force with with the dark moon ruling 11-12.

KILLING DAYS: Aries/head, July 16-17; and Leo/heart, July 24-25. Like June, there are just four days ruled by the two killing signs during July – the absolute minimum!

PEA/BEAN DAYS:

Gemini/arms, July 20-21, great days to plant bush or pole beans, snow peas or southern peas. At least half the equation is right with the bean/pea sign ruling even if the moon is in the dark phase. According to *Home Gardening in Kentucky*, we are getting toward the end of the safe planting time for all but snow peas. The chart, however, hasn’t been updated while we have been moved one USDA planting zone further south, 6B to 7A. So, I think we are safe to add a couple of weeks to the “Last Safe Planting Date.”

MAKING CHANGES: As is the cycle, the number of perfect days for making changes is diminishing each month. In June it was seven; in July it will be five. They are July 11-15 with the signs going out of the body beyond anything that functions and the moon in the dark phase, specifically Aquarius/legs (11-12), and Pisces/feet (13-15).

Changes might include starting a diet or exercise program, stopping smoking or other unhealthy habits, weaning small children or animals, scheduling elective surgery or dental work – anything requiring us to do something differently from the way we are doing it now.

POURING GRAVEL:

If you have gravel to pour on a drive or road on your farm, do that while the light moon rules, which is until 4:37 p.m. on July 10, as we have established. After that wait until July 25 after the new moon has settled in, continuing through Aug. 8.
