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Heavy rains, but little damage

Despite record-setting rainfall, flooded area, multiple tornado warnings and a dozen or so road closings, Scott County appears to have escaped the massive four-day storm system with little harm even though neighboring communities were not so fortunate.

rainfall totals for the storm system that struck about midnight Thursday and lasted through Sunday was about 8.4 inches, said Director Michael Hennigan of Georgetown/ Scott County Emergency Management and Homeland Security. Much of the rain fell between the start of the storm Thursday through Friday afternoon, although the

rain was light and steady throughout the weekend.

Early projections called for as much as 12 inches of rain over the four-day period, but the actual totals for Scott County appear to be far below those early estima-

Water levels rose throughout Thursday and Friday requiring several high-water rescues, especially on Lyle Road, but there were

no high-water rescues through the weekend as

residents heeded road closures and no one took unnecessary chances,

It wasn't as if there was no flooding. Peninsula Park, across from Cardome, was flooded well beyond Elkhorn Creek's banks. Several roads were closed due to high water, but alerts and signage warned motorists and others who avoided the areas.

Officials grew concerned when water

in the North Elkhorn Mobile Home Park behind Arby's restaurant on Paris Pike. Residents were encouraged to evac uate to a shelter established at the Church of the Nazarene on Lemons Mill Road, but no one left their home, Henningan

This past weekend's storms and heavy rainfalls have exposed clogged drains and stormwater issues that lead to flooding in Georgetown's residential neighborhoods. Over eight inches of rain fell during a four-day period, but some residents say their yards flood even with much less rain.

Residents in Bradford Place have experienced several feet of stormwater collection in their

Dave Moore's backyard flooded some four feet riding up the trunk of his weeping willow tree. His yard often floods when there is even less rainfall, he said.

"It's always been a few feet after a storm, but it goes down," Moore said. "We don't see damage fortunately, except trash, all the time." Moore has found everything in

Fatal accident shuts down I-75 NB ramp

Eriq Brock Mason, 28, of Stamping Ground, died Sunday following an accident involving a tractor trailer, according to Scott County Coroner Mark Sutton. The accident happened at the intersection of Cherry Blossom Way and I-75 NB Exit 126 around 7 p.m.

"This car had went up under the trailer there at the intersection," Sutton said. "The truck had turned left to go onto the interstate and the car was coming from the direction of Walmart."

Mason was pronounced deceased on scene, according to Georgetown Police Department Assistant Chief Josh Nash.

"We're still waiting on things to come in," Nash said. "We don't really know who is at fault or what, but at some point that vehicle went under the semi near the wheel well and got lodged underneath. That's what caused the fatality."

The accident is still under investigation, he said. No charges have been filed at this time.
