School is right around the corner in Scott County, with a handful of administrative changes in the public school sys-

Scott County Schools (SCS) will begin classes for the 2025-26 school year on Aug. 13, Director of Community Education Renee Holmes said, and a few district leaders have been hired or shifted roles throughout the past months.

"Dr. Brent Allen has been named Assistant Superintendent of Operations for Scott County Schools," a press release

from SCS reads. "Allen will continue in his role as Director of Pupil Personnel (DPP) as he supervises district operations including facility planning, building and grounds, commu-

nication, staffing, and safety." Allen assumes the role of re-

school for Scott cently retired **County Schools** Assistant Suis August 13. perintendent Dwayne Ellison, who worked in SCS for 26 years, the release states.

A new Director of Nutrition has also joined SCS, a press release reads.

"Scott County Schools has named Kristy Collins as the new director

of nutrition," states the release. "Collins is currently a culinary pathway teacher and Career and Technical Education (CTE) instructional lead at Scott County High

School where she has served as a family and consumer science teacher since 2004. Greg Branden-

burg has been named Director

of Maintenance for SCS, according to a press re-

"Brandenburg started with Scott County Schools 30 years ago as a school custodian and has served as a team leader in the maintenance de-

partment for more than 20 years," the statement reads. "In his new role, Brandenburg will oversee facility maintenance and new and seasonal construction projects. This department is responsible for HVAC, electrical, and plumbing throughout the district. The buildings and grounds of Scott County Schools include more than two million square feet under roof and

## GMWSS addresses water pressure, access concerns

Georgetown Municipal Water and Sewer Service (GMWSS) shared its plans to address water pressure concerns across northern Scott County. GMWSS General Man-

ager Chase Azevedo went before the Scott County Fiscal Court Friday, Aug. 8, to go over short-term and long-term plans and address citizen

Several residents in the Burton Tank water zone, which generally covers the northwestern part of Scott County around Stamping Ground, have expressed concerns regarding water pressure and line connections, Azevedo said.

One resident, Jamie Phelps, is trying to build a home on the Long Lick Pike property he purchased about four years ago, but was told the

water line could not be tapped, he said.

"At the time when I bought

it. when I checked into everything, (GMWSS) was allowing new connections," Phelps said. "Since 2021

until now, there have been several other people (who have) built, put in

water connections and

"Even though it runs through my property, the main water line, (GMWSS) is not allowing any new connections."

In the meantime, Phelps has to haul water from the city a couple of times a week, he said.

Other Stamping Ground residents rely on hauled water and other alternative collection methods for their homes, neighbors said.

"People still have cis-

tern water, you know, rain water," one neighbor said. "To me, it's no different than it being in

a tank underground.' Pressure issues in the Burton Tank water zone can be traced back to development in the late 90s and early 2000s, Azevedo said. Scott County Fiscal Court helped fund water lines throughout the county to supply drinking water to residents outside city limits, intended to meet immedi-

ate needs, he said. "I can tell you with certainty, in looking at that, that those lines were put in for the existing customers at that time, and then some planned growth," Azevedo said. "There's no way that two to three inch, four inch, six inch lines (are) going to provide for ultimate buildout and unlimited demand throughout the county.'
