Bird was scheduled to make his initial court appearance Monday afternoon. It was not immediately clear if he had retained an attorney.

In a sworn affidavit filed to support the charges against Bird and Martin, Evansville Police Department Officer Hunter Topper wrote that he and at least three other officers were dispatched to Bird's Davcohn Avenue home "in reference to a domestic violence in progress" just before 8 p.m. Saturday.

Once on scene, officers spoke to Bird and Martin separately. Both men described engaging in a physical alterca-

According to Topper's affidavit, Martin said he and Bird had been drinking Saturday night when they got into an argument about a barking dog.

"Martin stated he did not know who initiated it, however, the fight turned physical," Topper wrote. "Martin stated they both were shoving each other."

In Bird's account to officers, he reportedly described trying to defuse the argument by separating himself from Martin and making his way to the home's family room. But, Bird is report-

ed to have said, Martin responded by hurling a "glass object" at the wall before threatening to kill his dog.

Bird also reportedly accused Martin of "knocking everything off of a family room coffee table" and leaving items – including a television and surround sound system – strewn about on the floor.

"When entering the residence, I observed items strung all over the floor of the living room, including lamps, as well as bed sheets near the couch and TV sitting on the floor," Topper wrote.

In Bird's telling, the physical altercation commenced when Martin "began shoving him in an effort to get his phone away from him," the affidavit states. "Bird stated that Martin does this because he believes that Bird is filming him."

The altercation left both men with minor-but-visible injuries, according to the responding officers. Martin had "scratch marks" on his torso and dried blood on his face, Topper wrote. Bird reportedly had similar marks on his chest, back and torso.

As of Monday afternoon, Martin was still listed in the Vanderburgh County jail's inmate roster.

States is getting ripped off by paying higher drug prices than many nations despite leading the world in medical innovation. He said his administration plans to launch an investigation on "unfair and discriminatory trade practices" of other countries he said shifts the cost burden of pharmaceutical

drugs to Americans.

Drug prices in the United States are nearly three times higher than 33 comparison countries, according to a 2024 report from the Department of Health and Human Services.

The White House said Americans will begin to see lower prices on prescription drugs purchased through Medicaid in early 2026. Officials project the cost of Eucrisa to treat dermatitis is

expected to drop by 80%; Duavee to treat post-menopausal osteoporosis by 85%; Zavzpret for migraines by 50%; and Xeljanz to treat rheumatoid arthritis by 40%.

"Today, we are turning the tide, and we are reversing an unfair situation," Pfizer CEO Albert Bourla said.

Bourla said Trump's looming tariffs on drug imports "motivated" Pfizer to secure the agreement with the Trump administration. The previous week, Trump announced a new round of tariffs beginning in October and imposing a 100% duty on brand name drugs imported to the United States.

Drug companies have no limits when setting prices for brand-name drugs, but the amount consumers pay depends on negotiations hashed out with insurers and pharmacy benefit managers. Insurance plan requirements such as copays and deductibles also affect how much people will pay.
