Coleman plans to sue Roblox

Calls the platform 'sinister' venue for predators

In a new civil lawsuit, Kentucky Attorney General Russell Coleman is pushing for online gaming platform Roblox to tighten up security standards and ensure millions of children who log in every day remain safe. Standing in Frank-

measures that are easy to bypass. "This is not happening in the shadows," Coleman said during an Oct. 7 press conference at the attorney general's office. "This vile conduct and the criminals behind it have been allowed

to exist right there in the open." Roblox, launched in 2006, is an online platform where users can create their own games and share them with others who have joined. Users who download it create their own profiles and avatars and can then take part in activities such as solving puzzles alongside users from all over the world. Signing up is free, though some games require purchases, and users can communicate through private chats and voice conversations.

On its website, Roblox currently touts 111.8 million daily users, an increase from 82.9 million cited in its 2024-25 annual report. About 40% of daily users last year were under the age of 14, according to the report, which noted the company added more than 40 safety features and policies
