Praise the Lord

an MacPherson tells about traveling across England by train one hot Summer day. As the train rolled to a stop in a little village, he could

hear someone outside shouting, "Praise! Praise! Praise!"

He learned later it was the conductor calling out the name of the local station, which was Praze.

MacPherson later **SMITH** commented to the conductor that it was a wonderful thing always to "live in praise!"

I don't know the name of the person who wrote Psalm 150, and I don't know the town in which he lived, but I know the kind of attitude in which he lived. 13 times in the six verses of the Psalm, the grateful Psalmist speaks of praise. I don't know who this brother was, but he had a grateful heart.

Today we need a grateful heart. If we would live in an attitude of praise, it would make life sweeter and better

Pause here and take time to read Psalm 150 in your Bible. It will not take long, and then I want to share with you four things about a grateful heart.

First, a grateful heart finds someone to whom to give thanks.

This Psalmist reminds us at Thanksgiving time that there is someone to whom to give thanks each day. In each of these six verses, he names the one to give thanks to: "Praise the Lord." Each of verses 2-5 begins, "Praise Him," and verse 6

There is someone behind your good fortune and your blessings. It is not Lady Luck, nor a rabbit's foot or

horoscope. The one behind your good fortune is the Heavenly Father. He is the one to whom to give thanks.

Second, a grateful heart finds some place to give thanks. The Psalmist found his place of thanksgiving: "In His sanctuary ... in the firmament of His power" (verse 1).

Any place is an appropriate place in which to give thanks, but there is an appropriate place that has been provided: It is the house of God. "Enter His gates with thanksgiving and into His courts with praise: be thankful unto Him, and

bless His name" (verse 4).

Third, a grateful heart has something for which to give thanks. Governor Bradford and those first pilgrims had something for which to be grateful. They were in a new land, and a new life was before them. Despite their severe losses and great hardships, they set aside a time for thanksgiving. They had something for which to give thanks.

In verse 2 he sang: "Praise him for his mighty acts: praise Him according to His excellent greatness." Regardless of how difficult our way may be, there is always something for which to give thanks.

Finally, a grateful heart will find some way in which to give thanks. The Psalmist

was so grateful that he found many ways in which to show his thanksgiving. In verses 3, 4, 5 he shows the different ways he praised God: the trumpet, the lyre, the harp, tambourine and dancing, stringed instruments and flutes, cymbals. The Psalmist was simply showing us that, when the heart is grateful, it will find ways to thank God for His blessings. We can do this by trusting Christ as our Savior and living obediently before Him. We can do it by serving in various ways. We can do it by the study of His Word, daily having communion with Him in prayer. We do it by sharing Christ's love with others. The grateful heart will find a way in which to give thanks.

Dr. A. J. Cronin tells of a doctor he knew who prescribed a "Thank you cure" for his frustrated and emotionally disturbed patients. When Dr. Cronin could find no physical symptoms, he would prescribe that the patients would say "Thank You" for six weeks when anyone did them a favor. According to Dr. Cronin, he had a good cure rate. The patients were helped by finding ways to express their gratitude.

The word "thanks" or "Thanksgiving" appears about 140 times in the Bible. God wants us to have a grateful heart and find ways to express our gratitude.

There is always something for which to give thanks. Remember, thanksgiving leads to thanks-living! If you think, you will thank! Praise ye the Lord!

deep into my soul where only You may reside in the infinity of Your love. Find my most inner being and dwell until I am fully com-







surpassed 1,000 points scored. "He's a great scorer at all three levels, and is just a big-

time player," Johnston said. "He's one of the top players in the state." Logsdon averaged 21 points and 6.8 rebounds a game last

season and shot 37.8% on 3pointers, making 74-of-Armstrong, a 6-2 swingman, averaged 16 points and 5.8

boards a game, and Johnston says he's a "mismatch problem" for teams.

"He's a great shooter and finisher around the rim, and an energy player for our team," he said. Armstrong made 43.8% of his 3-point tries last year, making 35-of-80 from behind the line.

Langdon averaged 14.6 points and 5.2 rebounds a game and is a settling presence for the Cougars.

"He's an extremely underrated player in the region," Johnston said. "He's a strong, athletic guard, and can score at all three levels."

Joining the three is Mardis, a 6-3 guard, who averaged 16.2 points and shot 43.1% on 3s for LaRue County.

He also shot 80.9% at the free-throw line last year.

"I think we are a good outside shooting team that can play fast and with good pace," Johnston said. "If we share the ball and don't force tough shots, we will be tough to guard. We still have to get more consistent on the defensive end, especially our help-side defense, and rebounding, but we are getting better in those areas. We are bigger, quicker, and more athletic in all five spots this year, so we need to use that to our advantage."

Junior guard Kyle Higdon is expected to also start, and Johnston calls the 5-10 Higdon "the glue guy to our team this season."

"He's a great rebounder and passer, ... and makes hustle plays," Johnston said.

Senior guard Chase Baunach, junior forward Evan Hasty, and sophomore forward Trigg Payne and sophomore guard Kamden Sanders also will contribute, Johnston said.

Having veterans like Armstrong, Logsdon and Langdon is important, Johnston said.

"Those three guys help me a lot when it comes to teaching the younger guys things," he said. "They also don't take it easy on those guys. They make them compete, which is only going to help those younger kids and our program down the road."

Grayson County opens the season Dec. 1 at home against Central Hardin.
