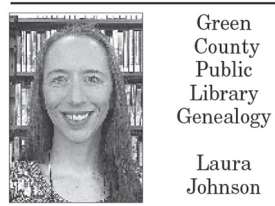


Dora Calhoun, Life & Family

Dora Bell Bibb was born in Green County on April 5, 1858. At that time, her parents, James and Harriett, were slaves. They had each been born in Green County.

Dora's future husband, Alfred Calhoun/Calhoun, was also born into slavery in Green County on August 5, 1846. His father, Edward, was born here, but his mother, Mary, had come from Virginia.

During the Civil War, the Bibb and Calhoun families, along with countless other families in our country, were granted their freedom.

The Emancipation Proclamation, issued by President Abraham Lincoln on January 1, 1863, declared that all enslaved people in the Confederate States "shall be then, thenceforward, and forever free."

Slavery officially ended on December 6, 1865, when the 13th amendment to the constitution was passed and ratified, abolishing slavery across the nation.

The exact date of Dora's freedom is unknown, but she would have been seven years old when slavery was abolished.

Alfred Calhoun had enlisted in the Union Army on May 31, 1865. He joined at Louisville with the 125th Regiment, United States Colored Infantry, Company K. The military unit was newly formed for service.

In January 1920, the Calhoun household consisted of Alfred, Dora, their daughter Nancy, and her daughter Anna Dora, age 10.

Later that year, on August 4, Dora passed away in Charlestown, Indiana from cancer of the uterus. She was 62 years old. It isn't clear why she was in Indiana,

but her death certificate indicates that a physician there had her in his care for at least one month.

Dora Bell Bibb Calhoun was brought home and laid to rest in the Old Community Cemetery just outside of Greensburg.

By 1930, Alfred was 84 years old and living in a home he owned on Water Street in the Scottsville neighborhood of Greensburg. Nancy was still living with her father.

Alfred Calhoun died on March 16, 1932, at his home. He had been one of only three surviving Civil War veterans left in the county. He was laid to rest by Dora's side in the Old Community Cemetery.

Despite the hardships and challenges they undoubtedly faced, Dora and Alfred built a life together grounded in resilience and hope. Their union marked the beginning of a new chapter, not just for themselves, but for their descendants who would carry forward their legacy of perseverance.

time in the military are known, but he did return to Green County once completed. In 1870, he was living in his mother's household in Greensburg.

Dora also lived at Greensburg in 1870, with her parents and younger siblings, Joanna, Jimmy, and Clarissa.

Dora Bibb and Alfred Calhoun were wed on January 23, 1876 at Summersville. The bride was almost 18 years old, and the groom was 29.

The couple's first child, Emma, was born in September 1876. A son, James Willie, arrived about two years later. Also born to them were Mary Nina about 1880, Nancy Agnes about 1886, and Claudy about 1891.

According to the 1900 census, Dora gave birth to seven children, five of whom were still living. The names of their other children have not been discovered.

Dora and her family rented a home in Greensburg on Stone Quarry Street, now 1st Street.

Feb. 7, 1985

Snow storms continue - The latest in a series of winter storms left 12 inches of snow and drifts up to 4 feet deep.

Schools closed - The county's schools have been closed 17 days this year due to bad weather.

Pierce, Mrs. L. W. Davis - Twelve inches of snow and temperatures below zero have caused water pipes to freeze.

Fuel truck overturns - A B & L Oil Company truck loaded with 750 gallons of kerosene overturned at McKinney Corner. No one was injured.

Feb. 13, 1975

Stolen truck recovered - A fertilizer spreader truck stolen from Green County Farm Supply Friday was recovered in Taylor County Tuesday. The truck was used to transport \$25,021 of stolen merchandise

from the business. **Morans robbed** - Rural and Maydell Moran were tied up and robbed when two men forced their way into the Moran's motel room at Forrest City, Arkansas. The men stole cash and other valuables.

Upton crowned - Ann Upton was crowned GCHS Valentine Queen. Morris Wright was chosen as King.

Pierce, Earlene Atwell - What happened to the old home remedy Castor Oil? All the lemon and sugar could not change our horror of it, nor all the begging and pleading change one whit our mothers' faith in it.

Feb. 12, 1965
