The following excerpt is taken from “Nicholas McCubbin, 1780-1855, His Ancestors and Descendants” by Gleason McCubbin, published in 1980:

Nora Belle Rafferty [a McCubbin descendant] was a large woman, with dark hair and dark eyes. She married John Martin Bradshaw, who was a tall, slender man, with dark hair and blue eyes. His main occupation was that of carpenter. He raised a good, big garden, as Nora liked and enjoyed a good vegetable garden. She liked to cook, was a good cook and invited many people to stay and eat with them. They were very regular in church attendance, but the husband rarely took a position of leadership, while Nora was very active in church affairs and would lead in public prayer. John Martin would counsel with his children but, if punishment was necessary, it was usually taken care of by Nora. He was usually a very calm, mild-tempered person. They had both an organ and a piano in their home and Nora played the organ on occasion. They wanted daughter Edith to learn to play one or both, but she was not so inclined.

Buford had the stature of his father, being tall, with dark hair and brown eyes. He at-

tended Jones Elementary School and then followed his father into construction and carpentry work. He also became an electrician and worked with Otis Keith, of Buffalo, Kentucky, in that capacity for many years. He attended and was a member of Liberty Baptist Church, where his brothers and sisters also attended. He died from cancer.

Hobert was not as tall as Buford or his father, but was of medium height, slender and had dark hair, but had a ruddy, outdoors complexion and blue eyes. He also was a carpenter and contractor, said to be very good with blueprints, which he picked up from his father and working companions. Hobert served in the United States Navy about four years, during World War II.

Chester is tall and slender, as was his father and older brother Buford, with the same dark hair and eyes. He also was a carpenter and sometimes owned a sawmill. He would move his mill from place to place, as necessary, to saw out a boundary of timber. He attends Liberty Baptist Church, is active and sings in the choir, when his health permits.

Edith looks like her father and brothers, with the stature and dark hair and eyes typical of the family. She received a fall from atop a gate or fence, when she was a child, and walks with a limp. She worked several years in a restaurant at Buffalo, Kentucky, and some of her customers there were relatives,

including Perry Walton McCuhbin. Edith is very active in church affairs, has taught Sunday School, sings in the choir and does many other things for her church and her Lord. She is married to Hardy Warren, who, in 1979, has just retired. He worked for Hodgenville Building Supply but, prior to that, farmed and worked at Fort Knox.

Wilburn has the family characteristics of height, dark hair, etc. He, too, has been a carpenter, and, in addition, worked some at a sawmill. He is a deacon at the same Liberty Baptist Church that his brothers and sisters attend. He had a severe heart attack a few years ago, and his work is very limited.

These brothers and sisters all live, or have lived, very near each other, along a strip of US61, just south of Creal, in Green County.

• Currently, Green-Taylor Water District assesses a \$1.50 fee for credit/debit card transactions. Green-Taylor Water District is proposing to change its tariff to state the following: “When a customer makes a payment by credit card or debit card, the processor (not the District) will assess a convenience fee for providing this service. Prior to processing the transaction, the customer will be informed of the fee amount.” The amount of the convenience fee assessed by the processor will be actual cost.”

• Green-Taylor Water District’s customers mail in their meter readings monthly. Green-Taylor is requesting as part of its leak adjustment policy that to be eligible for a leak adjustment the customer must submit actual monthly meter readings to the District so that the customers adjustment is based on actual usage and not estimated readings.

• Green-Taylor Water District is proposing to change delinquent penalty from the 20th day of the month following the month of water usage to the 15th day of the month following the month of water usage.

• Green-Taylor Water District is proposing to change the disconnect date for nonpayment from the 15th day of the month following the month the bill is received to payment must be received by end of business day on the 20th day of the month following the month of water usage or customer will be subject to disconnect on the 21st.

• Green-Taylor Water District proposes to add ACH-Bank Draft/Automatic policy to its tariff. Where the customer can elect to have their bill paid by bank draft to the District at no charge to the customer. The ACH-Bank Draft will be withdrawn on the 10 of each month.

Any person may submit a timely written request for intervention by mail to the Public Service Commission, Post Office Box 615, Frankfort, KY 40602. The request for intervention must establish the grounds for the request including the status and interest of the party.

If the PSC does not receive a written request for intervention within thirty (30) days of the initial publication or mailing of notice, the PSC may take final action on the tariff filing.
