Campbellsville's Heartland Church buys Bargain Hunt building for expansion

The Heartland Church is rapidly growing, and church officials closed on pur-chasing the former Campbellsville Bar-gain Hunt building on Tuesday, June 10. The property, located at 1309 East Broadway Street, Campbells-ville, was also home to the Campbellsville Ap-parel Company before that company closed.

Founded in 2023, the Heartland Church's mission is to love God, love people, and make disciples in Camp-bellsville and beyond.

Heartland began worship in a family home, grew into an event space location, and is working to-wards a new, larger, permanent home at the Bargain Hunt site.

"We've seen God do too much to slow down now," said Chapman Bean, lead pastor at Heartland. "We grew into the Good Com-pany Wedding and Event Venue, and that space has been incredible; we've used that event space every Sunday since late 2023," Bean added. "The problem is we've never had room for families and kids, and we've quickly out-grown that space as

well."


While remodeling plans are being devel-oped for the Bargain Hut building, Heart-land Church will continue meeting at Good Company's 111 West Main Street, Campbellsville.

"God has so much to offer Taylor Coun-ty through the Heart-land Church, and purchasing our new

space will enable us to fulfill our calling. We invite you to help in this church-plant-ing journey with us," said Beans. We are looking for ministry partners to 'get in-volved, get invested, and get invitational' and would love to have you with Heartland as we move forward with God's timeline," added Beans.

Grant given for Blessing Bags Program




