Harlan woman celebrates 50-year career

Harlan County woman is celebrating a career that has lasted for 50 years at a local bank, and she has no plans to call it a day anytime soon.

Jones asked her mother to go in and pick her up an application, which she did.

Jones remembers the Harlan branch opened in March of 1975.
