received over the years," the organizers added. "If the community sees value in keeping Oktoberfest alive, we hope new leadership will step up to carry it forward."

"The organizers extend their heartfelt thanks to the businesses, volunteers, and attendees who have supported Oktoberfest Harrodsburg throughout the years."

The tourist commission announced they were taking over Oktoberfest the next day. Here is their statement:

"The Mercer County Tourist Commission is dedicated to ensuring that the beloved Oktoberfest tradition in downtown Harrodsburg continues, despite the decision by the previous Oktoberfest committee to discontinue the event. While we respect and appreciate the hard work and dedication the committee has shown over the years in making Oktoberfest a success, we are not willing to let this cherished tradition fade away.

"Oktoberfest has become a staple in our community, bringing people together to celebrate music, food, and culture. Understanding its importance, the Mercer County Tourist Commission is stepping in to take the reins and ensure that the festival

remains a highlight of Harrodsburg's annual events.

We are incredibly grateful to the Oktoberfest committee for the time, effort, and passion they have poured into this event over the years," said Daarik Gray, Executive Director of the Mercer County Tourist Commission. 'While change is never easy, we believe in the future of Oktoberfest and are excited to continue its legacy. I have full confidence in our Events Coordinator, Kaitlyn Harder, who has played a vital role in planning the festival in recent years. Her dedication and vision will ensure that Oktoberfest not only continues but thrives."

"The Mercer County Tourist Commission is actively working on plans to continue Oktoberfest in downtown Harrodsburg in a way that honors tradition while also introducing fresh ideas to enhance the experience. More details will be announced in the coming trying to work out the logismonths."

On Monday, Gray said the tourist commission plans to stick with Oktoberfest's original announced dates.

"Kaitlyn has been working her butt off for the past week," Gray told the city commission.

Gray said they have con-

tacted the vendors and are meeting with the production company that handled the staging, lighting, and sound at last year's event.

"We're trying to be cost effective," Gray said. He said they may need to cut Sunday, which has always seen the lowest attendance of the threeday festival, but declined to give any details beyond that.

Gray said he had received at least 50 calls from people asking to help with the event.

In addition to approving the street closures for Oktoberfest, the Harrodsburg City Commission approved street closures for the Christmas parade on Friday, Dec. 5, starting at 6:30 p.m. The parade, a partnership between the Tourist Commission and the Mercer County Chamber of Commerce, will culminate with the Christmas tree lighting in Old Towne Park.

In another partnership with the Chamber of Commerce, the tourist commission will organize a New Orleansthemed kick-off for the Kentucky Heritage Jazz Festival on Friday, Oct. 10, at Old Towne Park.
