REQUEST FOR QUALIFICATIONS FOR PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING SERVICES MERCER COUNTY SANITATION DISTRICT

I. Introduction

The Mercer County Sanitation District is seeking Statements of Qualifications (SOQs) from qualified consulting firms for preliminary, design and construction phase engineering services to serve the Herrington Lake area of Mercer County. The project will include preliminary engineering, design engineering, and construction phase services to provide public sewer to the Chimney Rock, Bradshaw Camp, and Herrington Woods communities. The sewage will be conveyed down SR 152 to the existing Burgin Central Pump Station through a new force main.

SOQs will be evaluated using a Qualifications-Based Selection (QBS) process, based on written submittals only. The Evaluation Committee will consist of the three District Directors and the Executive Director. The consulting firm scoring highest in accordance with the evaluation criteria listed below will be invited to negotiate scope and services. In the event the District fails to successfully negotiate with the highest-rated firm, it will proceed to negotiate with those firms submitting SOQs, according to their ranking, until a contract is successfully negotiated.

Lengthy and/or elaborate SOQ packages are neither necessary nor desired. Consultants are required to limit their responses to 15 single-sided pages, with line spacing set at not less than 1½. Use of graphic illustrations in lieu of exposition is strongly encouraged. Four copies of the SOQs must be submitted to the Mercer County Sanitation District by 12:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 12, 2025, to be considered responsive. SOQs may be submitted by mail to P. O. Box 303, Burgin, KY 40310, or in person at 801 Pleasant Hill Drive in Burgin. Submittals must be made in sealed envelopes, and clearly marked as follows: "Statement of Qualifications for Preliminary, Design and Construction Phase Engineering Services for the "Herrington Lake Force Main Project."

II. Project Purpose & Scope The purpose of this project is to provide public wastewater collection and treatment services

for unsewered areas in the Herrington Lake area to include the Chimney Rock, Bradshaw Camp, and Herrington Woods communities. The sewage would be conveyed down SR 152 to the existing Burgin Central Pump Station through a new force main.

The scope of services required for the project shall include all preliminary, design, and construction administration services necessary to successfully complete the project. The project shall meet funding requirements provided through the Kentucky WWATERS program.

III. Evaluation Criteria

A. Firm's prior experience in the field of wastewater collection and transmission, and specifically grinder pumps and low pressure, small diameter sewers. - 25 points

B. Qualifications of the specific individuals who will be assigned to the Project Team - 25

C. Past record of performance, including quality of work product and timeliness – 15

D. Familiarity with the proposed project Area - 25 points

E. Prior experience with grinder pump / low pressure sewer collection and force main design. – 10 points

CITY OF BURGIN AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 2025-01-14

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BURGIN, KENTUCKY, ESTABLISHING REGULATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS FOR THE LICENSING AND OPERATION OF ESTABLISHMENTS FOR THE SALE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES WITHIN THE CITY OF BURGIN, KENTUCKY, AND PROVIDING FOR THE ADMINISTRATION AND **ENFORCEMENT OF THIS Ordinance**

WHEREAS, pursuant to an election held on November 5, 2024, a majority of the voters of the City of Burgin, Kentucky were in favor of permitting the sale of alcoholic beverages in the City;

WHEREAS, the City of Burgin adopted Ordinance No. 2025-01-14 on February 25, 2025;

WHEREAS KRS 243.230(2) grants cities the authority to enact an ordinance preventing the issuance of quota retail drink licenses; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to prohibit the issuance of quota retail drink licenses within the jurisdiction of the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Burgin, Kentucky, as follows:

SECTION 6

That Section 6 of Ordinance No. 2025-01-14 is per annum hereby amended to read as follows:

SECTION 6: LICENSES GENERALLY For the privilege of causing, permitting and

engaging in the actions, business, and transactions authorized thereby in regard to traffic in alcoholic beverages in the City and pursuant to the authority of KRS 243.060, there is hereby established a corresponding City license for each of the licenses described in KRS 243.060. In accordance with KRS 243.030 and

KRS 243.070, the fee for each City license shall be as set out in the following schedule, which may be amended from time-to-time as authorized by law. Only those licenses set out in this Section shall be issued.

\$500.00 (1) Distiller's license, per annum (2) Rectifier's license:

Class A, per annum

\$3,000.00 Class B (craft rectifier), per annum \$960.00

(3) Wholesaler's distilled spirits and wine

(22) [(20)] The holder of a nonquota retail malt beverage package license may obtain a Nonquota type 4 malt beverage drink license for a fee of fifty dollars (\$50). The holder of a Nonquota type 4 malt beverage drink license may obtain a nonquota retail malt beverage package license for a fee of fifty dollars (\$50).

SECTION 39

That a new section of Ordinance No. 2025-01-14, Section 39, is hereby added to read as

SECTION 39: QUOTA RETAIL DRINK LICENSES SHALL NOT BE ISSUED

As authorized by KRS 243.230(2). the City shall not issue quota retail drink licenses.

This Amendment shall be effective immediately upon adoption after second reading and publication in accordance with the requirements of applicable Kentucky law.
