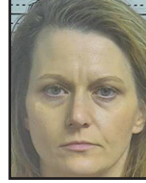

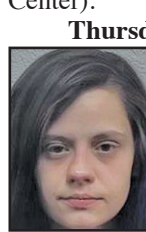

only UK touchdown in 1984 in a 30-26 win over Tulane in New Orleans when he recovered a muffed punt in the end zone.

"I still remember the moment I got a scholarship (after coming to UK as a walk-on). That was a surreal moment," Matt Stein said. "I didn't get home much. I didn't have a car and still remember telling my parents how surreal it was sitting in the meeting room and there was Jerry Claiborne right in front of me. Coach Claiborne was a big deal. I had always been into football and started playing in third grade but that moment when I got a scholarship from coach Claiborne was something I will never forget."

The former UK defensive lineman is confident his son is not only ready for this job but more than capable of doing it successfully.

"He is so driven. He has the right mentality to work 16 to 18 hours a day, seven days a week. He's okay doing that. He has the most wonderful wife (Darby) who gets that. I knew when he first met her and brought her around us she was perfect to be a coach's wife," Matt Stein said.

Kirk Carruthers, an All-American linebacker at Florida State who had 435 tackles in his career, is her mom's brother and her uncle.

"She knows her football and is a great support for William because she understands the demands a coach

faces," Matt Stein said.

Going into the college football playoffs, Stein has coached 40 games as Oregon's offensive coordinator and the Ducks scored 20 or more points in 38 of those games and had 30 or more points 32 times. Only twice in 40 games did Oregon have less than 300 total yards and it has 29 games with more than 400 yards. The Ducks also had three or more passing touchdowns in 18 of the 40 games.

"He is a great decision maker and is really efficient. He doesn't have to keep going over stuff," Matt Stein said. "I have no doubt he'll handle this next month well coaching at Oregon and getting things ready at Kentucky. If he has to work 24 hours a day, he'll do it. He is really good about delegating. He will not micromanage people. He gives them a job and they know they better do it."

"He is really loyal to people who have the same mindset he has as far as being willing to start from the bottom and work their way up. If you do that, he is your best friend."

After being the No. 3 pick in the 2024 draft, Reed Sheppard had some struggles his rookie season as he averaged just 4.4 points and 12 minutes per game while shooting

about 35 percent from the field for the Houston Rockets.

Sheppard, a guard, has been much better this season after having his name tossed around in a lot of trade scenarios during the offseason. He's started numerous games recently and was a big part of 12 wins in a 14-game span. He's been one of the leading 3-point shooters in the league as he was hitting 45 percent while averaging 14.3 points, 3.3 assists, 2.8 rebounds and 1.6 steals per game.

"I was one of the people who loved what he did in college," Sporting News columnist Mike DeCourcy said. "I was still surprised that he was taken as high as he was (in the draft) but I knew he would be a very capable player at the NBA level. Sometimes you get defined by what you are paid or how high you were selected. It's more this is how you are supposed to be if you are selected this high."

DeCourcy empha-

sized he never doubted Sheppard's ability to play in the NBA and is glad he's proving himself in a big way this season.

"First of all, he is an extraordinary shooter. He has the ability to play both (guard) positions. He's got the size to play both positions," DeCourcy said. "I think at the very least, if he doesn't become an exceptional lockdown defender, he's always going to be disruptive. He reads the game so well."

DeCourcy said if Sheppard had been picked around 20th in the draft and was a rotation player, everyone would be happy with his production.

"But if you are the number two player taken, you are expected to be a star. When that doesn't happen, sometimes it can have a negative effect on your growth and that's why I am glad to see that is not happening in Houston (to Sheppard)," DeCourcy said.

ZONING AMENDMENT ORDINANCE 2025-22

This ORDINANCE relates to the proposed Amendment to the Zoning Map of Harrodsburg, Kentucky, as described below:

- Statutory authorization – City of Harrodsburg, KY has the authority pursuant to KRS Chapter 100, "Planning & Zoning", to amend the official zoning map of The City of Harrodsburg, Kentucky.
- The proposed zone change to the property described below is as follows:
 - A. The current owner of the property is **EMJA, LLC**.
 - B. The location of the proposed zone change is at **544 N. College St in Harrodsburg, KY 40330**.
 - C. The current zoning of the property is **R-2**.
 - D. The requested zone change by the applicant is to **B-2**.
 - E. The Planning & Zoning Commission conducted a public hearing on **November 7th, 2025**.
 - F. The Planning & Zoning Commission recommended **APPROVAL** of the proposed zone change and Adopted Findings in Fact on the **7th day of November 2025** confirming the request was in agreement with the provisions of KRS Chapter 100.213.
 - G. The City Commissioners of the City of Harrodsburg had a first reading to the proposed zone change on the **24th** day of **November, 2025** at **12 PM**.
 - H. The second reading of the proposed zone change by the City Commissioners of the City of Harrodsburg shall be on the **8th** day of **December 2025** at **12 PM** in the City of Harrodsburg meeting room, at 208 S. Main St. in Harrodsburg, KY.

This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after second reading by the City of Harrodsburg City Commissioners.
