County hires new animal control officer

The Mercer County Fiscal Court has hired a new animal control officer.

At their regular meeting on Tuesday, Dec. 22, the fiscal court hired Cody Stumph as animal control officer effective Jan. 5, 2026, at \$20 an hour.

Marty Hurst resigned as animal control officer earlier this month. Hurst was hired in September 2024 and agreed to hire an addition-

trol officer in June. He was recognized by the fiscal court in October for handling a local homeowner's deceased pet when the homeowner was away. Hurst's resignation goes into effect Dec. 26, 2026. He will help train his replacement before he leaves.

Last month, the fiscal court hired Carson Cutts as the new director for the Mercer County Animal Control Center.

A Harrodsburg man has been indicted on multiple charges of incest.

Matthew F. Hughes, 75, of 1744 Perryville Road, was indicted on three counts of incest as well as 1st degree rape, 1st degree sodomy and 1st degree unlawful transac-

felonies, and one count of 1st degree sexual abuse, a class D felony.

On or about Jan. 1, 2014, to Dec. 31, 2019, the defendant is accused of engaging in deviate sexual intercourse with two children, according to the indictments. Between the dates of Jan. 1, 2017, and the Dec. 14, 2020, the defendant is also accused of
