KSP Arrests 16 Child Predators

Kentucky State Police (KSP) has arrested 16 individuals as part of a nation-wide operation aimed at protecting children from online exploitation.

Last Thursday, Governor Andy Beshear announced that the Electronic Crime Branch (ECB) of KSP participated in

Operation Safe Online Summer, which was conducted throughout April by all 50 states and coordinated by the **Internet Crimes Against** Children Task Force. This resulted in the arrest of 16 perpetrators from across Kentucky, bringing the number of predators arrested since 2019 to 325.
