USDA: Deadline approaches for acreage reports

STAFF REPORT

After spring planting is complete, agricultural producers in Kentucky have until July 15 to make an appointment with their local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county office to complete crop acreage reports.

"In order to receive many USDA program benefits, producers should file an accurate crop acreage report by the applicable deadline,' said David Wayne, State Executive Director in Kentucky. "Call your local FSA office to make an appointment after planting is complete to report your acreage and take care of any other FSA-related business.'

HOW TO FILE A REPORT

A crop acreage report documents a crop grown on a farm or ranch, its intended use and location. Producers should file an accurate crop acreage report for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage and prevented planted acreage before the applicable deadline.

The following acreage reporting dates are applicable in Kentucky:

July 15, 2025: Perennial Forage, all other crops and Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)

December 15, 2025: Fall Seeded Small Grains To file a crop acreage report, producers need to provide:

- Crop and crop type or variety
- Intended crop use
- Number of crop acres
- Map with approximate crop boundaries
- Planting date(s)
- Planting pattern, when applicable
- Producer share(s)
- Irrigation practice(s)

• Acreage prevented from planting, when applicable

Other required information

ACREAGE REPORTING DETAILS

The following exceptions apply to acreage reporting dates:

• If the crop has not been planted by the acreage reporting deadline, then the acreage must be reported no later than 15 calendar days after planting is completed.

• If a producer acquires additional acreage after the acreage reporting deadline, then the acreage must be reported no later than 30 calendar days after purchase or acquiring the lease. Appropriate documentation must be provided to the county office.

Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) policy holders should note that the acreage reporting date for NAP-covered

from beginning to end. The steps at the end of the process were precise and, once completed, Perry said the canned products can be stored in a cool, dry place for up to two years.

crops is the acreage reporting date or 15 calendar days before grazing or crop harvesting begins, whichever is earlier.

Producers with perennial forage crops should check with their local FSA office to see if their crops are eligible for continuous certification, which rolls the certified acreage forward each year until a change is made.

PREVENTED PLANTED ACREAGE

Producers should also report the crop acreage they intended to plant but were unable to because of a natural disaster, including drought. Prevented planted acreage must be reported on form CCC-576, Notice of Loss, no later than 15 calendar days after the final planting date as established by FSA and USDA's Risk Management Agency (RMA).

FARMERS.GOV PORTAL

Producers can access their FSA farm records, maps and common land units through the farmers.gov customer portal. The portal allows producers to export field boundaries as shapefiles and import and view other shapefiles, such as precision agriculture boundaries within farm records mapping. Producers can view, print and label their maps for acreage reporting purposes. A login.gov account that is linked to a USDA customer record is required to use the portal.

Producers can visit farmers.gov/account to learn more about creating an account. Producers who have the authority to act on behalf of another customer as a grantee via an FSA-211 Power of Attorney form, Business Partner Signature Authority or as a member of a business can now access information for the business in the farmers.gov portal.

GEOSPATIAL ACREAGE REPORTING

Acreage reports using precision agriculture planting boundaries can be filed electronically with an approved insurance provider or an authorized third-party provider, who will then share the file with FSA staff. Producers should notify their local FSA office if they submitted an electronic geospatial acreage report containing precision planting boundaries that they want to use as part of their FSA acreage report.

"The LWCF is funded through the National Park Service and administered by the Kentucky Department for Local Government. The application requires a public hearing for citizens to hear about the project and address any concerns they may have.

"The total project cost is \$79,280. The grant will cover 50%, or \$39,640. We are assisting Eminence with concurrently applying for a matching grant through the KY Cabinet for Economic Development which will provide \$38,450 toward the project. This will leave Eminence responsible for \$1,190 toward the project."

The public hearing for the park improvement project was closed and the regular meeting opened at 6 p.m., where the council conducted a second reading and approved the upcoming fiscal year's budget, spanning from July 1, 2025, to June 30, 2026.

Totaling slightly over \$3.8 million, the city's budget includes a nearly \$6.4 million carry forward balance, \$3.8 million in revenue and \$5.6

million in expenses. ???

The council also approved the second reading of an ordinance amending reconnection fees on water/sewer bills.

The disconnect fee is \$50 to have service restored. If late payments are made three times in one year, the customers will be considered "habitual status" and a \$150 refundable deposit will also be required.

Eminence Police Chief Scott Wilcoxson gave a police activity report for May, which included 124 complaints, 18 traffic stops, 15 written warnings, four criminal cases, 10 domestic violence reports, four traffic collisions, nine incident reports, five city ordinances, nine business checks, one crisis intervention, and five arrests on seven total charges.

Wilcoxson also said the department ordered 96 boxes of Narcan free of charge from the Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy and that the ordinance violation tracking system (iWorQ) is in use now.

Mayor Fred Downey then opened the bids to sell the city's 2010 Ford F250, finish mower and the 2007 Chevy Tahoe.

The council approved two bids from Rodney Abbott of \$250 for the finish mower and \$5,000 for the 2010 F250, but did not accept the bid for the Tahoe.

Downey also said a stop sign would be placed at Vernon Avenue to slow drivers down.

The Eminence City Council's next meeting is scheduled for July 14 at 6 p.m. in the East Broadway Municipal Building.



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
