on that path and host a support system for them.

"We act as a hub for the other things that people in recovery need, which is jobs, housing, transportation, and all of that," Short said. "We just want to become a one-stop shop for anybody who is either in recovery, long term, short term, but to be a resource not only for them, but for their families as well."

CPR currently serves as a non-profit organization. The organization had originally formed via an awareness rally. The rally will be returning Saturday, September 27th, 11 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. at Beaver Trail Park. The event is free and there will be guest speakers, music, food trucks, and vendors. Short said that through the first rally, they had discovered that there were no local Narcotics Anonymous programs in the area.

CPR plans to serve people in Barren, Hart, and Metcalfe Counties.

Short had conducted an economic calculator report in October of 2024 with the Fletcher Group. She used the report to help determine how investing in Community Partners for Recovery would impact the community in the long run.

The report outlined a cost-benefit analysis, which includes economic benefits such as avoided healthcare utilization, reduced criminal justice involvement, and increased market and household productivity, as well as increased health and well-being as reflected

by reduced morbidity and premature mortality.

The economic costs included in the report were annual operating costs, including staffing, supplies, and programming, as well as any capital costs related to infrastructure and land purchases. The report focused on a time horizon of 15 years.

According to the report, it costs nearly \$300,000 to operate with a 40% success rate. The report also showed that in a span of 15 years, it is estimated that over 7,500 residents would be served in the community who were in need of addiction recovery. Nearly 500 residents would have been treated or served yearly.

"It's not a one-person problem [and] it's not a one-family problem," Short said. "It is a community problem, and that is why it takes all of us as a community to really make strides to help with the opioid epidemic and any other form, like substance use disorder."

Community Partners for Relief offers a multitude of resources, including SMART Recovery. While this program was initially founded in the 1990s, Short said it is very new to our area.

"SMART Recovery is rooted in rational emotional behavior and cognitive behavior, and it is for any addictive behavior, whether that be drugs, alcohol, gambling, sex," Short said. "It's based on recognizing your triggers, learning how to cope with your triggers, and managing a balanced life."

Additionally, CPR has partnered with community schools, offering the SMART recovery program for teens. The organization also offers support groups for friends and family of those in recovery.

Christy Wall, a native of Glasgow, is the program director at Community Partners for Recovery. Wall started with a background in corrections. She moved back to the community after a 15-year hiatus, Wall said, God led her to work in outpatient addiction treatment. While doing so, she met Short and others who envisioned a place for recovery here in Barren County.


"This is a passion of mine," Wall said. She said that for a long time she didn't understand why.

"But now I know growing up, my mother battled addiction, so I saw it firsthand and dealt with all the things and the stigma," Wall said. "People didn't talk about addiction so freely now, or recovery, and we still got work to do, but it is a lot more open and not so shameful now than it was when I was younger."

Wall said, what she is doing with her life experiences is taking them and using them to serve and help others.

A surplus items list compiled by Hensley was approved as surplus, and it was approved to advertise for sealed bids on the items.

Edmonton Police Chief David Robertson presented his August activity as 16 arrests, 11 non-injury accidents, 1 injury accident, 3 alarms, 2 animal complaints, 7 domestic violence, 2 DUIs, 2 EPOs, 2 fights, 5 incomplete 911 calls, 5 new investigations opened, 6 motorist assisted, 9 medical calls, 1 drug complaint, 68 traffic stops, 2 warrants, 2 escorts (1 volleyball team and 1 funeral), total complaints were 61 and total citations were 26. The department patrolled 5,182 miles.

The one bid received for a new police cruiser was opened. Devore read the bid, "We've got one bid from Bachman Auto Group. They are out of Jeffersonville, Indiana. They bid a 2026, Durango Pursuit V8 all-wheel drive, black for \$43,548, and a 2024, Durango

Pursuit V8 gold allwheel drive, and it is \$40,400."

The cost of installing lights and equipment was discussed before the motion was made to accept the bid for the 2026 Durango Pursuit. The motion was approved.

The 911 Dispatch Center report was presented next by Director Jordan Crump, "For the month of August, for Edmonton police department, we did a total of 277 calls. For the Sheriff's Department, we dispatched 354. Edmonton fire department was 50 calls, North Metcalfe had 23, and Summer Shade had 33."

"There's a few others here and there, but mostly overall, a little over 50% we dispatch the county, and around 45 to 50% for the city. And this past week, I was in Louisville for the Kentucky Emergency Services Conference. Did a lot of continuing
