Massaroni secures \$332,275 for Nelson County

FRANKFORT — Rep. Candy Massaroni of Bardstown announced this week that Nelson County will receive \$332,275 in infrastructure funding under legislation approved by the Kentucky House and Senate.

Projects include the following:

- \$173,000 to the Nelson County Fiscal Court for the resurfacing of Yates Cooney Neck Road
- \$159,275 to the Nelson County Fiscal Court for the resurfacing of Shady Lane


“I am very pleased to see this funding come to Nelson County as a direct result of the efforts and hard work done by the legislature,” Massaroni said. “Industry follows infrastructure, and I believe that with these improvements to our roadways we will be bringing in a time of growth for our community.”

HJR 46 outlines which local maintenance projects receive state funding in the next fiscal year. The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet’s (KYTC), Department of Rural and Municipal Roads collected applications for city and county road resurfacing and other safety projects from local officials across the Common-

wealth. KYTC graded the requests and submitted their findings to the Legislative Research Commission and Interim Joint Committee on Appropriations and Revenue to review. Projects are ranked one to ten based on the severity, with ten


being the most hazardous. HJR 46 only funds the road projects ranking ten on the scale. Under the measure, 145 projects are funded, totaling over \$23.8 million.

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

**SAFETY TIPS FROM KEMA**

- Watch your step. Floodwaters often hide sharp and dangerous debris, like broken glass and metal. Floodwater can also be contaminated with oil, gasoline or sewage.
- Wear the appropriate protective clothing and gear such as boots, gloves and safety glasses when moving debris.
- Stay away from electrical utility equipment after a storm, or if it is wet, to prevent being electrocuted. Report any utility issues to your local utility company.
- Flooded homes are hazards. Get a professional to check for loose wires, mold and hidden damage before re-entering.
- Never drive into a road covered with flowing water. One foot of flowing water can sweep a car off the road; two feet will carry away an SUV or pickup. Even six inches of water can knock you off your feet. Never walk or drive through swift water. Turn around, don't drown.
- Respect barricades and posted signage. If you encounter a flooded road, turn around. You're not only putting your own life at risk, but also the lives of first responders.
- If you encounter a dark traffic signal, treat it as a four-way stop.

**LOCAL RESOURCES AND ASSISTANCE**

Boston School, New Haven City Hall and the Civic Center in Bardstown have become drop-off locations for supplies for residents displaced by the flood. Boston School and the Civic Center

have also been serving as emergency shelters during the flooding.

In a press release issued by Nelson County Government, the Civic Center has been designated the official drop-off location, and supplies will be distributed to other locations from there until 4 p.m. Wednesday. The county is looking for donations of the following items:

- Bleach
- Garbage bags
- Shop towels
- Paper towels
- Trash cans
- Sponges and scrub brushes
- Disinfectants
- Bottled water
- Non-perishable, shelf-stable food
- Shovels and rakes
- Buckets
- Heavy-duty tarps
- Wet/dry vacuums
- Batteries
- Fans
- Dehumidifiers
- Mops, brooms, dustpans
- Squeegees
- Totes
- Dog/cat food

**STATE ROAD CONDITIONS AS OF TUESDAY A.M.**

As of press time Tuesday, the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet District 4 office in Elizabethtown has noted several state roads that are covered with water. Those include Ky. 52 mile markers 2-5, and the on and off ramps to the Bluegrass Parkway are inaccessible. Also inaccessible are Ky. 52 mile markers 6-8, Ky. 61 mile markers 0-3, Ky. 247 mile markers 6-8, Ky. 733 mile markers 2-14, and U.S. 62 mile markers 0-4. In addition, Ky. 605 in Washington County at the Nelson line has a mudslide on the road, and Ky. 1754 at mile marker 6 at the Nelson County line is flooded.

**LINCOLN TRAIL, NELSON COUNTY EXTENSION OFFERS RESOURCES**

The Lincoln Trail District Health Department is also offering resources for local residents, including tetanus boosters and vaccines for those performing flood cleanup. The LTDHD recommends anyone who has encountered floodwaters should wash hands thoroughly with soap and water. The LTDHD also notes that assistance is also available for WIC recipients who cannot reach their office or who have been displaced by flooding. Benefits can be issued by telephone at (270) 769-1601, and damaged items purchased with WIC benefits can be replaced. If safe drinking water is unavailable, infant formula can be issued in a ready-to-feed format.

The Nelson County Extension Office is also working to gather donations at the Civic Center of items needed for flood clean-up buckets that will be distributed to the community until noon Wednesday. Items needed include:

- 5-gallon bucket with lid (no screw lid)
- Liquid laundry detergent (32-64oz)
- Liquid concentrate household cleaner (16-40oz)
- Bottle dish soap (16-34oz)
- Insect repellent
- Scouring pads
- Clothespins and clotheslines
- Heavy-duty trash bags
- N95 dust mask
- Kitchen gloves
- Work gloves
- Scrub brushes
- Reusable cleaning cloths
- Spray air freshener (4-8oz)
