Kentucky's Quaintance taking his time in recovery from knee surgery

The health timetable for Jayden Quaintance is the biggest question surrounding the 6-foot-10 potential star for the University of Kentucky as he observes practices in Lexington.

He had surgery for a torn ACL on March 19, ending his freshman season at Arizona State. Quaintance is moving along in his rehab and recovery, but whether he's available at the start of this upcoming UK season is a wildcard at the moment.

"Tve been progressing pretty well," Quaintance said while declining to put a timetable on his recovery. "Tve been trusting the trainers and coaches to try and get me right. Mentally, I've just been kind of focusing on the next step and kind of also focusing on the moment."

Quaintance did not mention a specific timeline for his return to the court.

But instead of focusing on when he can come back to action, Quaintance doesn't want to rush the process.

"It's really just trusting the trainers and coaches to try to get me back at 100%," he said. They are really invested in my future and what I can do to help here, and they don't want to rush me to get back."

Quaintance has been limited in participation in practice, but he has been a keen observer

"I haven't been able to do all the reps that everyone else has been able to do, but I've been watching, observing, taking notes, learning some actions, getting adapted to the playing style," he said. "Getting adapted to the way the coaches think, and I feel like that's going to prepare me really well for when I can go 100%.

"I've been watching film and doing things that way. So that's been another way that I've been learning, but watching from the sideline, just seeing what guys are doing, just visually, high school one year early)

I feel like that's really helped and put up impressive numbers more than glad to have me memorize some of the things. And being able to picture what I'll be able to do, or where I'll be at during those steps, has been very helpful and impactful for me."

Quaintance originally committed to the Cats as part of the 2024 recruiting class under now former head coach John Calipari. When Calipari left UK for Arkansas, Quaintance re-opened his recruitment and ended up at Arizona State.

Centenary head coach Byron Dawson, whose team went 4-6 last year in its first official football season since 1947, called Mumme "one of the most iconic offensive minds in college football history."

"With over 40 years of coaching experience, there's simply no substitute for the wisdom and leadership he brings," Dawson said. "He'll be a game-changer as he guides our young gents with the Air Raid offense."

Mumme served as the Wildcats' head coach from 1997-2000, mentoring Heisman Trophy finalist Tim Couch during his time in Lexington. Across his UK career, Mumme collected a 20-26 record with two bowl game appearances, including an 18-17 mark in his first three years.

Couch, who later became the first player selected in the 1999 NFL Draft, credits Mumme and his staff for keeping him at Kentucky.

2022. "All right, I think I'll reconsider transferring at this point."

Couch stayed, and the rest was history - as Mumme's offense began to permeate throughout the sport.

"I had no idea it would be so prevalent around college football and now it's even made its way to the NFL," Couch said. "It's really cool to see that we were on the ground floor of breaking that system into major college football and where it is today."

Mumme resigned from Kentucky in 2001 amid NCAA rules violations within the program, including payments and illegal gifts to players. However, the NCAA concluded that Mumme was innocent of any individual rules violations.

Mumme later had head coaching stops at Southeastern Louisiana, New Mexico State, Division III McMurry and Division II Belhaven. He last coached as an offensive coordinator for the XFL's Dallas Renegades in 2020.
