REED changed forever. It was on another perfectly ordinary day over 2,000 years ago, that an angel of the Lord divinely interrupted the simple life of a young girl. The angel's name was Gabriel; the girl was Mary. It happened in a town called Nazareth. (The true story is told in Luke 1 and 2.)

God had chosen Mary for something very special ... exciting ... and terrifying. She would be the mother of the promised Messiah. She was the one the prophets and preachers had talked about for hundreds of years.

Mary was a teenager, engaged to be married to a fine man named Joseph. She could picture it all: they would have a home, a good life, and many children. Trump admin says signlanguage services hinder his image control

The Trump administration is arguing that requiring realtime American Sign Language interpretation of events like White House press briefings to the public," part of a lawsuit

House to provide the services. Department of Justice attorneys haven't elaborated on how doing so might hamper the portrayal President Donald Trump seeks to present to the public. But overturning policies encompassing diversity, equity and inclusion have become a hallmark of his second administration, starting with his very first week back in the White House.

administration in May, arguing that the cessation of American Sign Language interpretation which the Biden administration had used regularly — represented "denying hundreds of thousands of deaf Americans meaningful access to the White House's real-time communi-

cations on various issues of national and international import." The group also sued during Trump's first administration, seeking ASL interpretation for briefings related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In a June court filing opposing "would severely intrude on the the association's request for President's prerogative to a preliminary injunction, control the image he presents reported Thursday by Politico, attorneys for the Justice seeking to require the White Department argued that being required to provide sign language interpretation for news conferences "would severely intrude on the President's prerogative to control the image he presents to the public," also writing that the president has "the prerogative to shape his Administration's image and messaging as he sees fit."

Government attorneys also argued that it provides the hard of hearing or Deaf community The National Association for with other ways to access the the Deaf sued the Trump president's statements, like online transcripts of events, or closed captioning. The administration has also argued that it would be difficult to wrangle such services in the event that Trump spontaneously took questions from the press, rather than at a formal briefing.
