## **ARTICULATING AGRICULTURE**

### Telling the untold stories of local producers

hen Oakes and Kellie Routt bought their first two honey bee colonies, they were unaware of just how much the decision would transform not only their lives, but also the whole community. Seven years later, what began as a hobby has grown into a thriving, multifaceted operation is now home to more than six million bees and rows of native and cut flowers that help produce about 4,000 pounds of honey each year. With elderberries, seed-saving and plans for a certified processing facility, it's not just about production, but about impact — on health, on the land and on the people they serve.

As someone who's always felt most comfortable in nature and with his hands in the dirt, Oakes began researching beekeeping on the suggestion of a colleague. He found

# Weldon Loop project advances

Repairs to Weldon Loop Road in Upton could begin in as little as two months.

The possibility stems from the LaRue County Fiscal Court's Tuesday, June 24 unanimous approval of a memorandum of agreement between the county and the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Through the resolution, the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet agrees to provide \$800,000 to fund the reconstruction of approximately 1.425 miles on Weldon Loop, beginning at its intersection at KY-224 (Upton Talley Road) and ending at its intersection with Johnson Road.
