Burglary investigation underway, two arrested, one being sought

On Monday, Feb. 24, 2025, a residential burglary was reported from a home located in the Dukedom area of Graves County near the Tennessee state line. A hidden camera on the property took images of two men and a woman driving a 2011 Tan Chevrolet Impala. The suspects broke a lock and entered, stealing items, and placing them in the trunk of the vehicle. Sheriff's deputies were quickly able to identify the three individuals. Two of the three suspects were arrested.

- 40 year old Jeffery Rushin of Fulton County, Ky.
- 34 year old Courtney L. Meadows of Wingo, Ky
- 28 year old Tyler S. Forrester of Dukedom, Ky

Office and charged with 3rd degree burglary on a warrant from Graves County Sheriff's Office. Meadows was located at a residence by Graves Sheriff's deputies and charged with burglary 3rd degree. Forrester is on parole and is aware that he is wanted in connection with this incident. He is believed to have run into Tennessee and is operating the 2011 Tan Chevrolet Impala bearing Ky Tag# NOX588, that was used in the commission of the burglary. Tyler S. Trump takes credit for 'swift and unrelenting' action in speech to Congress

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump on Tuesday took credit for "swift and unrelenting action" in reorienting the nation's economy, immigration and foreign policy as he updated Congress and the American people on his turbulent first few weeks in office, which have featured a dismantling of the federal government, tensions with America's allies and a trade war compounding economic uncertainty.

His joint address to Congress was the latest marker in Trump's takeover of the nation's capital, where the Republican-led House and Senate have done little to restrain the president as he and his allies work to slash the size of the federal government and remake America's place

in the world. With a tight grip on his party, Trump has been emboldened to take sweeping actions after overcoming impeachments in his first term and criminal prosecutions in between his two administrations. "It has been nothing but swift and unrelenting action," Trump said of his opening weeks in office. "The People elected me to do the job, and I am doing it."

Out of power, Democrats made an immediate display of dissent with

stone faces, placards calling out 'lies,' and Texas Rep. Al Green's ejection from the House chamber after heckling Trump that he had "no mandate to cut Medicaid." After several interruptions, House Speaker Mike Johnson jumped in and called for decorum to be restored in the chamber as Republicans shouted "USA" to drown out the cries from the other side of the aisle. Johnson then ordered Green be removed from

the chamber. Other Democrats held up signs criticizing like "Save Medicaid" and "Protect Veterans" during Trump's remarks, seeking to drive public awareness to elements of Trump's agenda they believed might offer them a pathway back to the majority. Trump spoke at a critical juncture in his presidency, as voters

Juvenile arrested after shooting

On Feb. 26, 2025, at approximately 12:00 p.m., The Mayfield Police Department responded to West Fuller Street in reference to a shooting that occurred at the intersection of South 12th Street and Hwy 45 South (Fulton Road) in Mayfield. It is reported that a black SUV was following the victim's vehicle, and fired shots, striking the vehicle at least four times, narrowly missing the three occupants. At least eight shots were fired at the vehicle based on shell casings located at the scene. Two of the occupants were unharmed, and one female victim received lacerations to her face from flying glass and debris. Through investigation involving interviews, evidence collection, and security videos, the Mayfield Police originally identified the suspects as a 19-year-old Mayfield man and a fifteen-year-old Mayfield juvenile. The juvenile was arrested, and originally charged with:

- 24 counts of assault 1st degree (attempted)
- Possession of a handgun by a minor

- Discharge firearm other device across public road
- Possession of handgun by convicted felon

An 18-year-old, Kyler Ellis, then turned himself into the Mayfield Police Department on Feb. 27, 2025, in reference to the shooting. Ellis was the adult that was developed as a suspect in the shooting. The investigation revealed that Ellis had direct involvement with the shooting incident which resulted in the following charges:

- 3 counts of attempted murder
- 1 count of unlawfully providing/permit minor to possess handgun
- 1 count of unlawful transaction with a minor 2nd degree
- 1 count of criminal mischief 1st degree

Additionally, the juvenile's charges have been amended to:

- 3 counts of attempted murder
- 1 count of possession of a handgun by a minor 1st offense.
- 1 count of discharge firearm other device across public road
